## Election Day to take place amid pandemic

Tuesday, Nov. 3, is Election Day – in Union County. the State of Illinois and the United States.

Voters will decide a wide range of races, from president of the United States to Union County coroner, circuit clerk, state's attorney and a position on the county's board of commissioners.

Polling places in the county are scheduled to be open from 6 a.m. until 7 p.m. on Election Day.

Early voting in the 2020 election started in late September.

Union County Clerk Lance Meisenheimer said that 1,538 early voting ballots had been cast as of Monday, Oct. 26. The clerk said he anticipates that nearly 2,000 early voting ballots could be cast.

The county clerk also reported that 1,030 voteby-mail ballots had been received by his office.

Voters who plan to cast

their ballots on Nov. 3 can look forward to seeing safety as a top priority during place during a pandemic. Masks and hand sanitizer will be available. Election judges will be wearing safety equipment.

Heavy rain was in the forecast for the region Wednesday, and again on Thursday, today.

The National Weather Service office in Paducah reported on its website early this week that a combination of an upper level weather system and the remnants of Hurricane Zeta were expected to produce heavy rainfall over the Ohio River Valley during the middle part of the week.

Two rounds of rainfall ed in the Union County were expected: one Monday night into Tuesday and another one from Wednes-

day into Thursday. The weather service reported that the heaviest rainfall was likely from Wednesday night into

Thursday morning, today. The forecast was calling for as much as 3 to 4 inches of rain in the Southern Il-

linois area. Rainfall amounts recordarea during the period of Oct. 20-26 included .25 of an inch on Oct. 20, .16 of an inch on Oct. 23 and .28 of an inch on Oct. 26. Rain was falling on Tuesday morning, Oct. 27, in Union

County. Temperatures during the period of Oct. 20-26 ranged from a high of 83 degrees to a low of 43.

The high temperature fell from 82 on Oct. 23 to 50 on Oct. 24 after a cold front passed through the region. Following are temperatures for the period as re-



## 1,756 COVID-19 cases in seven area counties

Department reported a cumulative total of 1,756 confirmed cases of COVID-19 in its service area as of Monday, Oct. 26.

The health department serves Union, Alexander, Hardin, Johnson, Massac, Pope and Pulaski counties.

Southern Seven Health Department on Monday confirmed a total of 68 new cases of COVID-19 in the region it serves in Southern Illinois.

As of Monday, there were 596 active cases in the region.

The health department reported that the newly confirmed cases, by county, gender and age, included:

As of Oct. 26, there were 1,131 people in the health department's service area who had recovered since the start of the pandemic in the United States.

Twenty-six deaths had been reported in the region since the start of the pandemic.

According to the Illinois Department of Public Health, in Illinois there were 4,729 new individuals with COVID-19 identified on Oct. 26, bringing the confirmed total in the state to 378,985 individuals, with 9,522 deaths.

#### Suspect in custody

Union County State's Attorney Daniel Klingemann and Union County Sheriff Scott Harvel on Thursday, Oct. 22, reported that Dmitriy Seregeyevic Seleznev was apprehended without incident at approximately 1:30 p.m. on Oct. 7 by Vancouver police officers and agents with the Federal Bureau of Investigations at a business in Vancouver, Wash.

Seleznev has been charged with one count of X felony; four counts of child pornography, all Class 1 felonies; two counts of indecent solicitation of a child, both Class 2 felonies; two counts of traveling to meet a minor, both Class 3 felonies; and two counts of grooming, both Class 4 felonies. Bail is set at \$500,000 bond.

Seleznev has refused extradition to Union County and is being held at the Clark County Jail in Vancouver, Wash.

The process of obtaining a governor's warrant for the extradition of Seleznev has commenced.

## Halloween safety includes 3 W's

Wash your hands. Watch your distance. Wear your masks.

As we head into the holiday season, starting with Halloween, the Illinois Department of Public Health, IDPH, is issuing guidance to help people celebrate safely as we continue to battle the COVID-19 pandemic.

Guidelines include following the 3 W's: Wash your hands. Watch your distance. Wear your mask.

"One of the hallmarks of holidays and celebrations is gathering with friends, family and loved ones," said IDPH director Dr. Ngozi Ezike.

"We are still in a pandemic, and unfortunately, this year, that means the safest way to celebrate is to stay home and plan virtual gatherings.

"That said, IDPH recognizes that some who will choose to gather together anyway, and instead of denying that reality, we are issuing guidance and recommendations for safer ways to celebrate together in person.

"Remember, we know what our best tools are: wearing our masks, keeping our distance, limiting event sizes, washing your hands and looking out for public health and each other."

If you think you could have COVID-19 or have been exposed to someone who has COVID-19, do not participate in any in-person Halloween activities.

#### **Trick-or-Treating**

Anyone participating in trick-or-treating, including those passing out candy, should maintain 6 feet of social distance and wear proper face coverings.

Consider leaving individually wrapped candy (spaced apart) on a table in driveways or in front of walkways, sidewalks or any outdoor space where 6 feet of distance can be maintained.

A Halloween costume mask is not a substitute for a cloth mask. Ensure that breathing is not impaired if a cloth mask is worn under a costume mask. If so, discard the costume mask.

Trick-or-treat in groups with household members only.

Candy collected during trick-or-treating should not be eaten until after handwashing.

An alternative to traditional trick-ortreating is to set up in a large parking lot or other outdoor setting with tables with individually wrapped candy (spaced apart) where participants with a parent/guardian can parade past while still keeping 6 feet of distance and wearing a face covering. It's suggested to offer reserved time slots to limit everyone showing up at once.

#### Haunted Houses

Halloween haunted houses currently are not allowed in Restore Illinois Phase 4 Guidelines.

Consider open-air, one-way haunted forests or haunted walks where 6 feet of distance can be maintained and face coverings are used.

### Adult Costume Parties

The more time you spend at a gathering, the closer the contact, the

more people, the higher your risk of exposure to COVID-19.

Follow small social gathering safety tips from IDPH.

## Pumpkin Patches and Orchards

Cloth face coverings and social distancing should be enforced.

Use hand sanitizer before handling pump-kins, apples and other produce.

#### Hayrides

Hayrides should not exceed 50 percent capacity with parties spaced at least 6 feet apart.

Wear face coverings at all times when around people not from your household.

After participating in any of the above activities, if you think that you may have been exposed during your celebration, take extra precautions for 14 days after the event to help protect others.

You should:

Stay home as much as possible.

Avoid being around people at increased risk for severe illness from COVID-19.

Consider getting tested for COVID-19.

## Picking the perfect pumpkin

When you think of Halloween, you may think trick-or-treating and fall, but you likely also think pumpkins.

Illinois is the top pumpkin-producing state in the United States, says Ron Wolford, University of Illinois Extension horticulture educator.

"In 2018, Illinois pumpkin farmers produced an estimated 500 million pounds of pumpkins," he says.

"The town of Morton claims to be the Pumpkin Capital of the World, with 82 percent of the world's canned pumpkin processed there."

Although jack-o'-lantern pumpkins are edible, other squash varieties have better texture for making pies, soups and breads.

The world's largest pumpkin pie was made at the New Bremen, Ohio, Pumpkin Fest in 2010. The pie was 20 feet in diameter and weighed 3,699 pounds.

Pumpkins are grown on every continent except Antarctica.

The largest pumpkin on record was grown in 2016 and weighed 2,624 pounds.

## Tips for selecting the perfect pumpkin for carving

Choose a pumpkin with a stem at least 1 to 2 inches long. Never carry it by the stem.

Select a pumpkin with a flat bottom, so it will stand upright.

Avoid pumpkins with holes, cuts or soft spots. These areas will decay.

Use the thumbnail test. Press your thumbnail into the pumpkin, if your nail makes a scratch in the pumpkin, do not select.

Color is also important. Light-colored pumpkins are easier to carve because the skin is not as hard as darker ones, but they will not keep as well.

Before carving or display, wash the pumpkin with warm water and let it dry. The pumpkin will last longer in a cool place.

After carving, coat the inside of the pumpkin and the cuts with petroleum jelly.

A pumpkin cut for Halloween will last seven to 10 days depending on weather conditions.

Avoid using candles to light a pumpkin because the heat will cook the flesh, shortening its lifespan.





There are three ways to initiate change to the Illinois Constitution: (1) a constitutional convention may propose changes to any part; (2) the General Assembly may propose changes to any part; or (3) a petition initiative may propose amendments limited to structural and procedural subjects contained in the Legislative Article. The people of Illinois must approve any changes to the Constitution before they become effective. The purpose of this document is to inform you of proposed changes to the Illinois Constitution and provide you with a brief explanation and a summary of the arguments in favor of and in opposition to the proposed amendment. Proposed changes in the existing constitutional amendment are indicated by underscoring all new matter and by crossing with a line all matter which is to be deleted.

#### PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO SECTION 3 OF ARTICLE IX OF THE ILLINOIS CONSTITUTION ARTICLE IX – REVENUE

#### **SECTION 3. LIMITATIONS ON INCOME TAXATION**

(a) The General Assembly shall provide by law for the rate or rates of any tax on or measured by income imposed by the State. A tax on or measured by income shall be at a non-graduated rate. At any one time there may be no more than one such tax imposed by the State for State purposes on individuals and one such tax so imposed on corporations. In any such tax imposed upon corporations the  $\underline{\text{highest}}$  rate shall not exceed the  $\underline{\text{highest}}$  rate imposed on individuals by more than a ratio of 8 to 5.

(b) Laws imposing taxes on or measured by income may adopt by reference provisions of the laws and regulations of the United States, as they then exist or thereafter may be changed, for the purpose of arriving at the amount of income upon which the tax is imposed.

#### **EXPLANATION**

The proposed amendment grants the State authority to impose higher income tax rates on higher income levels, which is how the federal government and a majority of other states do it. The amendment would remove the portion of the Revenue Article of the Illinois Constitution that is sometimes referred to as the "flat tax," that requires all taxes on income to be at the same rate. The amendment does not itself change tax rates. It gives the State the ability to impose higher tax rates on those with higher income levels and lower tax rates on those with middle or lower income levels. You are asked to decide whether the proposed amendment should become a part of the Illinois Constitution.

#### ARGUMENTS IN FAVOR OF THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT

Illinois' current tax system unfairly benefits millionaires and billionaires and this amendment will set things right for middle-class and working people. Currently, it is unfair that billionaires pay the same tax rate as regular people.

Voting "yes" on the amendment means that the State will enact a new tax structure where only those making above \$250,000 a year will see their taxes go up. This amendment is simply upgrading Illinois' old tax system to a graduated system which is how the federal government and the majority of other states do it.

This Amendment Would Make Illinois' Tax System Fair.

Approval of this amendment would enact a fair system that allows the state to tax wealthy people at higher rates and lower income people at lower rates, replacing Illinois' current unfair tax system, in which wealthy people pay the exact same tax rate as lower and middle income people.

Illinois' current tax system unfairly benefits millionaires and billionaires, and approval of this amendment will set things right for the middle class and working people. This amendment will help small business owners by creating a stable economic environment for their businesses to thrive.

While others try to mislead you, under the current tax system in Illinois, policymakers already have the authority to set any tax rate and to change tax rates at their will. The current system forces policymakers to charge the same tax rate to everyone, regardless of how much money they make. If this amendment passes, the State will have the ability to tax higher income earners at a different rate. In fact, upon passage of this Amendment, a new tax structure will go into effect where 97% of taxpayers will pay the same or less, while only those making more than \$250,000 a year will see a tax

This amendment does not tax retirement income.

The Federal Government and Most States Use the Graduated Tax System Proposed in this Amendment, Not the Unfair System Currently Used in Illinois.

Illinois is among a minority of states that do not utilize graduated tax rates because the Illinois Constitution requires a "flat tax" that penalizes middle-class and working people and benefits higher

A majority of states and the federal government already use the kind of graduated income tax system proposed in this amendment to ensure that wealthy people pay their fair share of taxes. Nearby states including Iowa, Minnesota, Missouri, Ohio, and Wisconsin are among the majority of states that have graduated tax systems.

Illinois' Current Income Tax System Relies on Taxes from Middle and Lower Income Earners, While a Graduated System Would Lower that Burden and Fund Critical Programs such as Education and Human Services.

While some states have fair tax rates in which the highest income earners pay the highest tax rate, Illinois' "flat tax" rate continues to rely unfairly on taxes from middle and lower income earners. Under Illinois' "flat tax" structure, a nurse making \$50,000 per year pays the same tax rate as an executive making \$4 million per year. A graduated tax rate would have the executive pay more. Because of the way our current tax system is set up, the bottom fifth of Illinois taxpayers (those making below \$21,800) contribute 14.4% of their income to state and local taxes, compared to 7.4% for

the top 1 percent of Illinois taxpayers. If this Amendment passes, the State has already enacted a new graduated tax structure where 97% of taxpayers will pay the same or less.

Under the new tax structure, only the top 3% of Illinois income earners would pay more in income taxes. Everyone who makes \$250,000 or less a year would pay the same or less.

Over 95% of small businesses earn \$250,000 or less a year in profits, and their owners will not see a tax increase under the new tax structure.

This change will generate additional revenue each year that can help address Illinois' budget deficit and fund critical programs, including the State's education system, public safety, and social services like mental health and substance abuse treatment and domestic violence shelters.

After the COVID-19 Pandemic, We Need to Do All We Can to Help the Economy and Middle-Class and Working People.

Working people and essential workers like nurses, first responders, and grocery store clerks should not pay the same tax rate as the wealthy. Nurses making \$50,000 a year should not pay the same tax rate as an executive making \$4,000,000 a year.

Having wealthy people pay more would reduce the burden on working families. This is money that middle and lower income people need for housing, groceries, medicine, and essentials. When the wealthiest people pay more, middle and lower income earners can pay less while the State funds critical services that our essential workers rely on.

#### ARGUMENTS AGAINST THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT

- The Amendment gives the Legislature power to increase taxes on any group of taxpayers with no limits and no accountability and without any requirement to use the additional revenue to fund essential needs such as healthcare, education, or public safety.
- Taxes and spending are out of control. The Legislature should not be allowed to keep raising taxes until they get their spending under control.
- In the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, now is the worst possible time for a massive tax increase.

The Amendment gives the Legislature power to increase taxes on any group of taxpayers with no limits and no accountability and without any requirement to use the additional revenue to fund essential needs such as healthcare, education, or public safety.

The proposed amendment would give the Legislature unlimited new authority to increase income tax rates on any group of taxpayers at will, including low-income and middle-income families and small business owners. There would be no limit on the number of tax brackets that could be created and no limit on how high tax rates could be increased on individual taxpayers. In addition, this proposed change will pave the way for a tax on retirement income.

Nothing in the amendment requires the Legislature to do anything to control spending. Nor does it require funds to be spent on essential needs such as healthcare, education, or public safety. It would simply give the Legislature a blank check to spend billions of dollars however they want, with no accountability.

Taxes and spending are out of control. The Legislature should not be allowed to keep raising taxes until they get their spending under control. Illinois already has some of the highest property taxes and sales taxes in the nation. And the Legislature has increased Illinois income tax rates twice in the past decade to try to deal with the out-of-

control spending in Springfield.

Even before the COVID-19 pandemic, our state had a huge and growing multi-billion-dollar budget deficit, and the unfunded pension liability skyrocketed to over \$137 billion. That's because the Legislature has continued to increase state spending instead of eliminating government waste, corruption, and abuse.

Because they refuse to control spending or pass major reforms, the Legislature will just continue to raise taxes on everyone in Illinois, and middle-class families will be their next target. In the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, now is the worst possible time for a massive tax increase.

The COVID-19 pandemic caused layoffs, unemployment, bankruptcies, and closures. As small businesses and local employers struggle to rebuild, this is the worst possible time to impose huge new tax increases. Even before the COVID-19 crisis, many residents and businesses were leaving the state because of the high tax burden. If the Amendment passes, it would be the last straw for thousands of small businesses, causing more jobs to leave the state, and making Illinois lose out on investments to rebuild our economy. This would mean fewer jobs and less opportunity for Illinois families.






Many who claim Christ have separated moral responsibility



All hikers will be responsible for transporting themselves to the trailhead, and all will be expected to sign a waiver of liability.

Any other conditions required by executive order of the governor or recommendations of the CDC must be complied with.

## IHSA was expected to announce details for winter sports on Oct. 28

The Illinois High School Association, IHSA, Board of Directors met for its regularly scheduled virtual meeting on Monday, Oct.

IHSA posted on its website that at the Oct. 19 meeting, the board provided a timetable on winter sports decisions, and also voted to provide a one-time accommodation to the IHSA's Independent Team By-law in some sports.

The board also set a special meeting, which was scheduled for Wednesday, Oct. 28, when it was expected to announce more details about winter sports.

"We understand that student-athletes, coaches, parents, officials, and fans are anxious to learn more details about the plans for IHSA winter sports," IHSA executive director Craig Anderson said in an Oct. 19 online posting.

"We feel like we are making positive strides in our discussions with the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) to be allowed to conduct IHSA winter sports as scheduled.

"We believe we have a plan to do so safely and want to provide IDPH with ample time to review the winter sports plans, and supportive data, we have provided them.

"We expect to have a response from IDPH with final recommendations for winter sport plans, including any accommodations and postseason plans, by October 26.

'We will then reconvene our board to officially vote and announce that information shortly thereafter."

The board's accommodation to the IHSA Independent Team By-law (3.100) will be applicable for the 2020-2021 school year only and will grant specific exemptions to spring and summer season sports.

Winter sports (basketball, wrestling, boys swimming and diving, cheerleading, dance, bowling, girls gymnastics), which remain in their traditional season, will have no accommodation related to the by-law.

"The board determined it was prudent to make modifications to the independent team by-law for the sports that were displaced from their traditional high school season," said Anderson.

"They also came up with what we believe is a reasonable compromise for summer sports. The board is hopeful that the high school teams will be given priority when conflicts occurs.

"We believe making a modification now will allow high school coaches and non-school team coaches to begin communication on how they can collaboratively resolve scheduling conflicts."

Sports competing in the IHSA's 2021 spring season (football, boys soccer, girls volleyball) will be granted the accommodation to participate simultaneously on school teams and nonschool teams throughout the duration of their high school season (Feb. 15-May 1).

Sports competing in the IHSA's 2021 summer season (baseball, softball, track and field, girls soccer, boys volleyball, lacrosse, boys tennis) will be granted the accommodation to participate simultaneously on school teams and nonschool teams beginning on June 4.


The summer season is slated to run from April 19 to June 26.

"Given the unique challenges of this school year, it remains important for our board to be flexible and creative in seeking participation opportunities for students," said IHSA board vice president Robert Nolting, the principal at Andrew High School in Tinley Park.







The property assessment equalization factor, often called the "multiplier," is the method used to achieve uniform property assessments among counties, as required by law.

State law requires property in Illinois to be assessed at one-third of its market value.

Jackson County has been differently, with farm homesites and dwellings subject to regular assessing and equalization procedures, but with farmland and farm buildings assessed according to standards based on productivity.

The equalization factor

is determined annually for each county by comparing the sales price of individual properties sold over the past three years to the assessed value placed on those properties by the county supervisor of assessments/county



## Historical monuments, memorials and statues

By William Furry for the Board of Directors of the Illinois State Historical Society

The Illinois State Historical Society, ISHS, welcomes the ongoing public discussion about monuments and commemoration in the Prairie State.

Communities across Illinois face decisions about the presence of commemorative statues, monuments and memorials and the naming of public spaces and buildings.

The ISHS encourages Illinois communities engaged in these discussions to carefully consider not just the historical facts of the figure being commemorated but the historical context and intent of the commemoration itself.

Furthermore, those engaging in these discussions should reflect on who constitutes their communities and if all relevant voices are being heard.

Finally, each community should determine what stories best represent their history and values and how best to tell those stories in a commemorative landscape.

Removing or reinterpreting a monument does not "erase" nor "change" history. It asserts that interpretations of the past are dynamic and change over time. Voices and perspectives that were previously silenced are now active participants in choosing the priorities and purposes of public commemoration.

Ultimately, each community is challenged to determine which stories best represent their history and values and how best to tell those stories in a commemorative landscape.

We also want to remind our fellow Illinoisans that historians who specialize in the history of Illinois and its people have done careful and nuanced research that could meaningfully inform these discussions.

Drawing on their expertise potentially helps uncover the intentions of those who erected the monuments, and how these monuments function as symbols whose meaning changes over time.

Since 1899, the ISHS has stood for the open inquiry and rigorous research that helps to connect people with our state's history.

We encourage communities to continue considering questions of monuments and commemoration, and welcome them to avail themselves of our network of experts and resources.

Oard Orrin Garrott, U.S. Army Air Corp, 1941-1945, Navigator, Bombardier, Radar-Specialist, He flew in the A-20 as a navigator and was dispatched to Europe in May, 1941. He served in Europe and North Africa.

In November, 1942 his aircraft was shot down over North Africa, just weeks after his brother Carl was shot down and killed in France. O. Orrin Garrott was captured and sent to a Prisoner of War Camp in Germany. He suffered starvation, illness and injury before his group was liberated in April, 1945 by General Patton's forces.

In 1945, Garrott returned to Illinois on inactive duty. Major Garrott was called back to active duty in 1951. Second tour of duty, navigation on the B-36 and the B-47. Again he served in the U.S. and in Europe. In 1966, Lt. Col. Oard Orrin Garrott retired from the Air Force.



Carl Garrott, Army Air Corps 1941, Normandy France, He was serving as navigator on a B-24 when his aircraft was shot down over Lille, France. That crew did not survive and is buried as a group in the National Cemetery at Fort McPherson, Nebraska. Fort McPherson **National Cemetery in North** Platte, Neb., has served as the final resting place for American men and women who have served their country at many different times in many wars throughout the years. In some instances, positive identification has been impossible due to the circumstances of the deaths. There were (in 2005) 81 group burials in Fort McPherson National Cemetery near North Platt, Nebraska. 1st Lt. Carl Garrott's marker in Fort McPherson National **Cemetery reads:**

In January 1944, near Cassino, Italy, at Rapido River the 36th Infantry lost 2,877 men in a 48-hour battle with German Forces. The 36th Infantry landed inland on the French Riviera in August 1944, battling through Germany and into Austria where the war finally ended on May 8, 1945, at Salzburg, Austria, for the 36th Infantry. Sgt. Pengress was blinded by a landmine on March 15, 1945, near Paffenhoffen. Awards include: five Battle Stars, African Campaign, European Campaign, two Purple Hearts, Good Conduct Medal, Silver Star, Presidential Unit Citation and World War II Victory
