Remote Learning Days begin for Illinois schools

Illinois State Superintendent of Education Dr. Carmen I. Ayala on Friday, March 27, declared that Remote Learning Days would begin for schools statewide on March 31 and continue until in-person instruction can resume.

During Remote Learning Days, schools may implement either an E-Learning Plan or a Remote Learning Day Plan that provides students with instruction and access to educators through whatever means possible.

Schools may use up to five Remote Learning Planning Days at any time after March 30 to work on Remote Learning Day Plans in partnership with their collective bargaining units.

Remote Learning Days, Remote Learning Planning Days, and Act of God Days count as actual student attendance days.

All of these days count toward the minimum length of the school year and absolutely do not need to be made up.

The Illinois State Board of Education, ISBE, convened a Remote Learning Advisory Group of teachers, students, paraprofessionals, related service personnel, principals, and district and regional superintendents to make recommendations to support educators, students, and families during Remote Learning Days.

The recommendations provide overarching best practices for instruction, grading, communication, social-emotional needs, content selection and delivery, family engagement, and other important concerns, as well as specific guidance for different grade bands, English Learners, and students with disabilities

"I am deeply grateful to the 63 members of the Remote Learning Advisory Group for giving their time and their expertise to help ISBE and schools across the state navigate a new way of teaching, learning, and caring for our students," Ayala said in a news release which announced the plans.

"We continue to be awed

by the phenomenal creativity, resilience, empathy, and problem-solving prowess of Illinois' educators, administrators, and students. The stories we see every day on social media, in the news, and in our email show us just how focused our educators are on supporting our children in this time of crisis."

The Remote Learning Recommendations strongly encourage that school districts' local grading policies during Remote Learning Days embrace the principle of "no educational harm to any child" and that school districts adopt grading models of pass or incomplete.

The Recommendations state that "Grading should focus on the continuation of learning and prioritize the connectedness and care for students and staff. All students should have the opportunity to redo, make up, or try again to complete, show progress, or attempt to complete work assigned prior to the remote learning period in that time frame.

A focus on keeping children emotionally and physically safe, fed, and engaged in learning should be our first priority during this unprecedented time."

ISBE has partnered with other agencies and advocates to provide additional clarity on other key topics.

ISBE released joint guidance with the Illinois Board of Higher Education and Illinois Community College Board to advise secondary and postsecondary institutions in Illinois on supporting and accommodating students who are enrolled in dual credit courses during the suspension of in-person instruction.

ISBE also met with the Illinois Federation of Teachers, Illinois Education Association, Illinois Association of School Administrators, and Illinois Principals Association to update the joint guidance regarding pay and work-PDF Document.

TIME magazine shared online that "with families

around the world abiding by social distancing guidelines recommended by health experts and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) officials to curb the further spread of coronavirus, neighborhood 'bear hunts' are becoming all the rage in some areas."

"Taking a page from Rosen's, members of a number of communities across the globe are placing teddy bears and other stuffed animals in their homes' windows to create a scavenger hunt-esque activity for kids who are stuck at home.

"While taking walks or drives around the neighborhood with their parents, kids in participating communities can have some fun by keeping an eye out for any number of stuffed animals that have been put on display at other houses.

Two moms in Union County, Rebecca Middleton Nesbit and Jessi Clark Watson, posted on social media that they wanted to join in encouraging "a fun and safe and healthy local activity for our children during this tough time."

Martha Ann Webb reported in her Anna News column for this week that Watson wanted her twins to have something to do while they were quarantined so she asked people to put bears in their windows.

People in Anna, Jonesboro and even in the country joined in putting bears and stuffed animals in windows, on porches and in their yards. Even on a mail box with a monkey in a tree.

Last count there were over 50 homes and businesses with bears or other stuffed animals. Young and old were joining in the safari to find the bears.

about Snowball on social media.



Additionally, Gov. JB Pritzker's Executive Order 2020-15, issued Friday, suspends state assessments for spring 2020, including the Constitution exam.

This action officially ends assessment activity statewide for the Illinois Assessment of Readiness, Illinois Science Assessment, SAT and Dynamic Learning Maps-Alternate Assessment for the 2019-20 school year.

ISBE recognizes that the free SAT provided by the state is the only opportunity many students get to take a college entrance exam.

ISBE is working with the College Board on developing options to allow current 11th grade students to take the SAT in the fall.

ISBE has refreshed its comprehensive guidance document with all of this information, as well as updated guidance on driver's education, nutrition, flexibility in expending grant funds, and Early Childhood Block Grant recipients providing child care to the children of essential workers.

Southern Seven Health continuing to see WIC and Department executive director Rhonda Andrews-Ray on March 27 shared the following update about the coronavirus/COVID-19 situation:

To the Residents of the Southern 7 Counties,

At this time Southern Seven Health Department is still implementing measures to keep our residents and staff safe from CO-VID-19.

Southern Seven Health Department is open and

Public Health patients via our "pull-up" policy.

Head Start sites are still closed. Meals are being prepared a week at a time and handed out to the Head Start children and any child that wants them.

In the Southern 7 Region (Alexander, Hardin, Johnson, Massac, Pope, Pulaski, and Union counties), NO people have tested positive for COVID-19. I anticipate this fact to change in the days and weeks ahead.

State reports 461 new COVID-19 cases

SPRINGFIELD – The IIlinois Department of Public Health reported 461 new cases of COVID-19 and eight new deaths in the state Monday as an outbreak worsened at Stateville Correctional Center in Crest Hill.

IDPH said one of the deceased was an inmate at Stateville, and 12 other inmates from the facility are now hospitalized with several requiring ventilators. IDPH said 77 others imprisoned at the facility have symptoms and are in isolation, and 11 prison staff members are isolated as well.

"The Illinois Department of Corrections is taking a number of steps to control the spread of COVID-19 in its correctional centers," according to a news release.

"Staff who work with individuals in isolation and quarantine, as well as in the health center, are wearing full personal protective equipment (PPE) and all staff are wearing some PPE. Staff are also having their temperature checked daily as they enter the facility."

IDPH said correctional centers with a confirmed case are placed on lockdown, meaning the only movement in the facility is for medical care, and incarcerated individuals who show symptoms are being

The eight deaths reported Monday were all in people over 50 years of age, with five in their 60s and one in their 70s across four coun-

Clark, Crawford, Marion, Randolph and Saline counties are now reporting cases, meaning the disease has been confirmed in 52 counties in the state, although medical experts have repeatedly warned that the spread is much wider than has been tested.

IDPH is reporting a total of 5,057 cases in Illinois, including 73 deaths, according to the news release. Those affected range from an infant to 99 years of age.

At a news conference Monday in Chicago, Gov. JB Pritzker announced plans to temporarily convert part of the McCormick Place Convention Center in Chicago into an alternate care facility for COVID-19 patients with mild symptoms who don't require intensive care.

The move is an effort to free up hospital beds for patients with severe CO-VID-19 cases as officials expect a surge in hospitalizations in the coming weeks based on data and trends seen in other large cities, according to the governor's office.

"Based on science, data, and the guidance of health experts, our approach to fighting this virus is twopronged: suppress the spread and increase hospital capacity to meet the need," Pritzker said.

"A critical component of increasing our capacity is identifying and building out additional facilities across the state to support our existing hospitals and health care system. In partnership with the city of Chicago and the U.S. Army Corps we are planning to increase capacity, so we're prepared to treat patients and save lives."

The McCormick Place project is supported by \$15 million in funding from the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

The first confirmed case of COVID-19 was diagnosed in the United States on January 20, 2020.

Within two months, the United States has more confirmed cases of the coronavirus than any country in the world, surpassing China, where the pandemic began.

There are now more than 85,000 cases in America and nearly 1,300 deaths, according to Johns Hopkins University.

In Illinois, the first case of COVID-19 was diagnosed on January 24, 2020.

Within two short months, there has been 2,583 diagnosed cases in Illinois of which 673 were diagnosed just yesterday.

To date, there have been 26 deaths in 37 counties in Illinois.

To put all of this into perspective, throughout the entire H1N1 pandemic in 2009, in Illinois there were a total of 3,387 state confirmed cases of H1N1 with 111 deaths. Only one H1N1 case was diagnosed within the southern seven counties.

In Illinois, the number of cases can be reduced by adhering to public health guidance on social distancing which includes staying at home.

Other guidance includes; washing hands frequently, disinfecting commonly touched surfaces, and staying home when you are ill. COVID-19 shares many symptoms with more common respiratory diseases.

I thought originally they were some type of bird feeders, but the other day I actually found out what they are.

While walking my dog around the race track, I noticed several younger boys throwing a disc around the park grounds near one of those metal contraptions.

I asked one of them what the metal baskets were that were located close by them. They said they were for playing disc golf, which they were doing.

Similar to a regulation golf course, I found out later when I looked it up on the internet that the sport has actually been around since the 1970s. Matter of fact, there are several of these type courses throughout the area.

The sport is played much like golf, but instead of using a ball and club, players use a disc or frisbee to throw and try to get it in that basket.

Just like golf, the object of the game is to complete least try. I'm looking foreach hole in the fewest strokes or fewest throws.

The target the disc throw-Recently, I've noticed ers are aiming at was that elevated mysterious looking metal basket. As a player progresses down the freeway (park), they must make each consecutive throw from the exact spot where the previous disc or Frisbee landed.

Similar to regular golf, from different holes (marked areas with a small white flag for disc golf) the golfer throws the disc or Frisbee and can actually have a hole-in-one if it's made on the first throw.

Each throw counts as a stroke, and the object is to have the least number of throws in getting the disc (Frisbee) in the basket.

Trees, shrubs and terrain changes are located around the freeway (park) and provide challenging obstacles for the golfer.

Disc golf courses are usually nine or 18 holes, considering the size of the course.

Just like in golf, when the final "putt" lands in the metal basket the hole is complete.

The sport looks like it would be interesting to at ward to the challenge to at least try my luck at it.



🤝 "The Preaching Pen" 🤏 The Gospel - The Saving Power of God As the apostle Paul neared the end of his third missionary journey, he wrote a letter to the church in Rome. As it began,

Paul said: "I am debtor both to the Greeks and to the Barbarians, both to the wise and to the unwise. So, as much as in me is, I am ready to preach the gospel to you that are at Rome also. For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth, to the Jew first and also to the Greek" (Rom. 1:14-16). It's the message of these verses I'd like us to briefly consider.

Notice Paul's repeated use of the personal pronoun "I" in these 3 short verses:

1. "I am debtor." Paul had an obligation to preach the gospel both to the Greeks and to the Barbarians (Romans) - that is the debt he owed - the duty he held - toward the Greeks & Romans. He had been saved from sin and that he had an obligation to all men to preach to them the Gospel.

2. "I am ready to preach the gospel to you that are at Rome also." He was at this time ready to go to Rome, the great "center of the world" where every class of people could be found, civilized and savage, wise and unwise. Paul was ready to preach.

3. "I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ." Paul was ready to preach it in Rome, in the very heart of heathen pride and power. If there was any place where one would be ashamed of a crucified Savior, that place was Rome during the reign of evil Nero.

The word "gospel" means "good news" or "glad tidings." Why was he not ashamed of the Gospel? For this reason: it is 'the power" not "a power" or "one of the powers," but the only power that God uses for man's salvation. Right there is the purpose of the Gospel! Salvation through the Gospel comes only to those who possess an active, obedient faith, not "faith only" (James 2:24).

Paul was not ashamed of the Gospel! Neither should we be! We must emphasize that the power by which God saves men is the gospel, the message of God's redeeming love for all of mankind. It's the power appointed by God for the salvation of all!

I remember growing up the church would be so full






Gene Wright, 92, of Anna, died Sunday, March 29, 2020, at the Illinois Veteran's Home in Anna.





State agencies address concerns about sheltering during severe weather amid current pandemic

With the arrival of spring, the risk of severe thunderstorms typically increases across the State of Illinois, including the risk for tornadoes.

In light of the coronavirus/COVID-19 pandemic and the recommended social distancing parameters, people who rely on public sheltering from tornadoes could be faced with the difficult choice of sheltering from the tornado in a community shelter or refraining from going to the shelter in order to limit potential exposure to COVID-19.

The Illinois Emergency Management Agency and the National Weather Service are recommending that your first priority should be to protect yourself from a potential tornado.

However, the decision to open a community shelter will ultimately be at the discretion of local officials.

Before you make the decision to go to a community shelter, you should first check with local officials to ensure they will be open.

This should be done ahead of any thunderstorm, well before any warnings are issued.

If you rely on community shelters, now is a good time to explore other options that might keep you safe from a tornado while also limiting your potential exposure to COVID-19.

The National Weather Service and state and local emergency management officials strongly encourage people to have a National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, NOAA, All Hazards Weather Radio with battery backup.

These radios can be programmed to receive alerts for specified counties to keep you and your family apprised of impending weather and post-event information for all types of hazards including natural (earthquakes), environmental (chemical spills) and public safety hazards (AMBER alerts).

When an alert is issued for the programmed area, the device will sound a warning alarm tone followed by the essential information.

In addition to NOAA weather radios, Wireless Emergency Alerts, WEA, can provide life-saving information about impending storms and emergencies.

These alerts can be sent to your mobile device without the need to download an app or subscribe to a service.

Not only are these critical tools to surviving overnight storms, but they can be extremely beneficial for those

The menu will include two pieces of fish, potato salad, slaw and a pickle for a donation of \$10.


