News Notes

Items of interest from throughout the Union County area

Union County property taxes were scheduled to be in the mail on June 1. Payment due dates are set for July 15 and Sept. 15. Union County Treasurer Leigh Burns said that about 13,000 bills were to be mailed.

Due to the Memorial Day holiday, the most recent COVID-19 update from Southern Seven Health Department was not available in time for this week's paper.

The Union County Sheriff's Office reported a fairly quiet Memorial Day weekend.

A flag retirement ceremony which is planned at Dutch Ridge Church near Alto Pass now is scheduled for July 19. The ceremony will be conducted by the Alto Pass Area Veterans Memorial Organization.

Attendance was very good at Memorial Day ceremonies held Monday morning at the Cobden Cemetery and at the Anna VFW post.

Fire of an undetermined origin early Wednesday morning, May 26, destroyed a structure near the Anna fire and police department building. The structure was being used by the City of Anna to store straw.

The Anna Fire Department was called to assist in the establishing of a helicopter landing zone following a traffic accident involving a pickup truck which happened at about 3 p.m. on Wednesday, May 26. The accident occurred in the southbound lane of Interstate 57 near the Lick Creek exit.

Union County animal control reported that they were caring for a small dog which was involved in the May 26 traffic accident on the interstate.

Change issued in order for wearing masks in courthouses

The Illinois Supreme Court on May 27 announced a change to its order on masking in Illinois courthouses, including the Union County Courthouse in Jonesboro, in order to conform to recent guidance from the Centers for Disease Control, CDC.

The court announced an amendment to its Aug. 27, 2020, order on Illinois Courts Response to COVID-19 Emergency (M.R. 30370).

"Over the past year, the Court has done its best to follow the most recent advice from the relevant health professionals," Chief Justice Anne M. Burke said in a news release.

"The CDC now advises that it is unnecessary for vaccinated people to be masked in most circumstances. We have revised our order to account for this change in CDC guidance."

The Supreme Court's

order sets the CDC rule as a "baseline" for masking requirements – it should be clear that unvaccinated persons must still be masked.

The recommendation of temperature checks has also been removed from the amended order.

Additionally, local jurisdictions may choose to be more protective than the CDC guidance.

The Illinois Judicial Conference's Court Operations During COVID-19 Task Force proposed to the Court the amendment to M.R. 30370.

The task force was created in June 2020 to serve as a rapid response unit to address ongoing challenges to court operations caused by the pandemic.

The chair of the task force is J. Timothy Eaton, partner at Taft Stettinius & Hollister LLP, and the vice chair is Chief Judge Eugene Doherty of the 17th Circuit.

Heavy rain possible in region

A developing storm system was forecast to bring a daily return chance of precipitation as early as late Monday night, the National Weather Service office in Paducah reported early this week. The chance for rain was expected to spread across parts of Southern Illinois, Southeast Missouri and Western Kentucky during the day on Tuesday.

The forecast was calling for the possibility of thunderstorms with heavy rain potential as early as Tuesday afternoon, spreading across the area Tuesday night.

As storms developed, moved in and across the area Tuesday night into Wednesday, influencing features that would maximize rainfall potential were expected to evolve heading into and through the day on Wednesday. Some storms could have had repeated locally heavy rains over the same areas.

SIU, Shawnee College approve agreement

Southern Illinois University Carbondale chancellor Austin A. Lane was joined by Shawnee Community College president Tim Taylor in the signing of a reverse transfer agreement between SIU Carbondale and SCC.

The agreement will allow eligible students to earn their associate degrees from Shawnee while they are working toward a bachelor's degree at SIU.

Under the agreement, Shawnee students who transfer before earning an associate degree are eligible for the program after completing a minimum of 15 transferable credit hours and at least one semester at SCC.

President Taylor, himself a two-time SIU alum, expressed his excitement with the partnership, stating that it will benefit both institutions as well as students.

Chancellor Lane spoke

about how the program will lower student debt by helping lower the likelihood of students graduating with excess numbers of credit hours.

At the signing ceremony on Thursday, May 27, Chancellor Lane and President Taylor were joined by Meera Komarraju, provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs at SIUC; Amanda Sutton, interim admissions director, SIUC; Josi Rawls, assistant director for transfer relations, SIUC; Jean Ellen Boyd, SCC interim vice president of academic affairs and student learning; and Lisa Price, SCC vice president of student success and services. The signing ceremony was held at SIU.

Free dental services offered to children

Children from throughout the region, including the Union County area, will be able to get free preventive dental services this summer at a variety of different sites and dates courtesy of the Southern Illinois University Carbondale Dental Sealant Grant Program.

In compliance with current Illinois COVID-19

safety measures, masks should be worn and social distancing will be practiced, organizers noted.

The participating children will receive examinations and fluoride treatments.

The exams fulfill the state requirements for children who are entering kindergarten, 2nd, 6th and 9th

grades in the fall.

While there is no charge to participate, children who are members of the "AllKids" program will need to bring their medical card.

There will be 14 clinics for children ages 3 to 17. Each will run from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. but participants must arrive by 1:30 p.m. to be seen.

One of the clinics is planned on July 8 at the First Baptist Church in Cobden. The church is located at 200 S. Walker St.

Children receive care on a first-come, first-served basis and appointments are not necessary. Senior dental hygiene students provide the services.

Program to offer no-cost health care services in region

A partnership involving multiple agencies is scheduled to bring no-cost medical, dental and optical care to Southern Illinois and Southeast Missouri from June 11 through June 25.

Operation Healthy Delta, an Innovative Readiness Training, IRT, program, will be offered through a partnership involving the U.S. Department of Defense and the U.S. Military's Reserve Forces, the Delta Area Economic Opportunity Corporation, DAEOC, along with Shawnee Development Council Inc., which serves the Southern Illinois area.

Those involved with the partnership said that uninsured or underinsured residents in need of quality health care can seek treatment at any location.

School physicals will also be provided at no cost to students.

No proof of insurance or identification is required for treatment.

Patients will be seen on a first come, first served basis.

State officials said the month was a time set aside to thank the thousands of foster families across the state who are providing temporary safe havens to youth and urge other residents to become licensed foster families.

Postal Service plans to increase rates

The National Newspaper Association, NNA, reported that the United States Postal Service on May 28 announced a planned adjustment of postage rates as of Aug. 29 for the public and commercial mail users. The Gazette-Democrat is a member of the NNA.

The cost of a first-class stamp will go from 55 to 58 cents.

For community newspapers using periodicals mail to reach readers, the average rate increase will be nearly 9 percent.

The NNA said in a press release that the rate increase is part of a new USPS business plan that also includes a weakening of service standards for mail that is moving across the country.

The proposed new rates must be reviewed by the Postal Regulatory Commission, PRC.

But the PRC has already granted USPS the authority to eliminate an inflation-based price cap on rates. It gave USPS a new set of parameters that allows it to charge more for mail that remains in the postal system while digital technology provides new competition for delivery of messages and advertising.

Brett Wesner, chair of NNA and president of Wesner Publications in Cordell, Okla., said the rate announcement was grim news for community newspapers that have been fielding months of complaints that subscribers are not receiving their copies on time.

"Nothing about this scenario is good," Wesner said. "These increases will require many newspapers to increase subscription prices to cover this new cost and readers will think we have lost our minds to charge more when USPS cannot get the paper to so many on time. But times are tough in our world. We have to pay these bills."

"The increase in the stamp cost will be felt most in a rural economy."

"People in small towns across America send checks through the mail to pay their bills. The stamp goes up and delivery goes down."

"I fear that just as economic hopes have started to rise for people returning to work, faith in the Postal Service's ability to serve the nation will put a damper on commercial activity for many of us."

"At the same time," Wesner said, "we have been warning our member newspapers for several years now that if Congress did not enact postal reform legislation, we would wind up exactly where we are today. It is not a recipe for success."

Wesner said that NNA continues to support postal reform legislation and has endorsed the proposed Postal Service Reform Act of 2021, introduced by U.S. Reps. Carolyn Maloney, D-New York, and James Comer, R-Kentucky.

SIU to launch new college

On July 1, Southern Illinois University Carbondale plans to launch a new college that delves into how people communicate, from the fine and performing arts to mass media.

The College of Arts and Media consists of six academic units in both undergraduate and graduate levels: the School of Architecture, School of Art and Design, School of Journalism, School of Media Arts, the School of Music and the Department of Theater.

About 760 students will be enrolled within the college, said Meera Komaraju, provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs.

Dark clouds covered the sky over Union County Thursday evening, May 27. The photograph was taken at the Veterans of Foreign Wars Carroll P. Foster Post No. 3455 near Anna. Very heavy rain fell on the Union County area during the evening of May 27. The National Weather Service office in Paducah issued a flood advisory for parts of the Southeast Missouri and Southern Illinois area, including Union County. The advisory was in effect until 8:15 p.m. May 27. At about 6:30 p.m., the weather service posted a message on its website which reported that thunderstorms in the area were being accompanied by heavy rain which would "cause low lying and other poor drainage areas to flood quickly." Up to 1 inch of rain had fallen at the time and another 1 to 2 inches was possible.



"The Preaching Pen"

Respect - A Lost Virtue

The dictionary defines "respect" as: "esteem for or a sense of the worth or excellence of a person, a personal quality or ability, or something considered as a manifestation of a personal quality or ability. That esteem and courtesy seem to be in short supply today, so I want to suggest a few things that are worthy of our respect, and encourage us to demonstrate it.

- 1) Respect for the Bible:** We need to get back to the Bible, because that's the answer to the problem of sin. As we communicate to God through prayer, God communicates to us through his Holy, inspired word (II Tim. 3:16-17). He doesn't reveal His will through dreams, visions, or feelings today. Colossians 3:17: "And whatsoever ye do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God and the Father by him." Not just any authority is adequate.
- 2) Respect for parents:** What a shame that so many today have a glaring disrespect for the elderly, especially their parents. Today's generations need to learn more perfectly the will of God regarding respect for parents. Proverbs 30:11, "There is a generation that curseth their father, and doth not bless their mother." This could be said of many in our time. Paul writes in Eph. 6:2: "Honour thy father and mother; which is the first commandment with promise." We must respect our parents, regardless of our - or their - age.
- 3) We need to respect our government.** God demands that we assume civic responsibilities — that we be law-abiding citizens (Rom. 13:1-7). As long as civil law does not go contrary to God's law, we have a God-given responsibility to obey and uphold civil law, including the paying of taxes; abiding by speed limits, seatbelt laws, etc. Let us get back to — and respect once more — Bible ethics. Let us respect the laws of the land.
- 4) Finally, what has happened to respect for our employers?** God demands mutual respect, fairness and responsibility in employer-employee relationships (Eph. 6:5-9). Service should be conscientious — work for that hour of pay, and what about when employees want to quit? The time was, out of respect and courtesy for the employer, that a two-week notice was given so the employer could have time to interview and hire a replacement, but in today's world of selfishness and disrespect (especially younger generations), when an employee quits, he or she doesn't give more than a day's notice — often less.

Let us always demonstrate respect when and where it is due, and may we above all demonstrate respect for the Word of God, for it is a "lamp unto our feet and a light unto our path."

The bipartisan World War II Pacific War Heroes Congressional Gold Medal Act to award Congress' highest civilian honor to American prisoners of war who fought Imperial Japan in the Pacific Theater of World War II has been introduced.

The measure was introduced by U.S. Rep. Mike Bost, R-Ill.

"When America needed them, the members of our Greatest Generation stepped up and answered the call," Bost said in a news release.

"Ahead of Memorial Day, I'm proud to introduce this legislation to honor the over 27,000 Americans held as prisoners of war and 11,000 who died in Japanese POW camps during World War II.

"As time passes, we cannot forget the sacrifices these brave Americans made on behalf of our nation. It has been a long time coming, but this is the recognition that they deserve."

The Congressional Gold Medal is awarded to individuals and groups to recognize their contributions to the United States.

People reminded to take precautions against tick bites

The Illinois Department of Public Health, IDPH, reminds people to take precautions against tick bites to prevent contracting diseases they may carry, like Lyme disease.

Other tick-borne diseases include Rocky Mountain spotted fever, tularemia, ehrlichiosis and babesiosis.

To avoid tick bites, people should diligently check themselves, their pets and help children with a tick check after spending time in areas where ticks live, such as in and near wooded areas, tall grass and brush.

Removing ticks within a 24-hour period reduces the risk of potential disease transmission.

IDPH shared some tips for healthy outdoor time:

Learn about tick removal and symptom awareness.

Walk in the center of trails.

Avoid wooded, bushy areas with high grass and leaf litter.

Wear light-colored clothing to make ticks easier to find. Tuck long pants into socks and boots.

Apply an EPA-registered insect repellent containing 20 percent DEET, picaridin, IR3535, or Oil of Lemon

Eucalyptus according to label directions.

Conduct full-body tick checks on family members (underarms, ears, belly button, behind knees, between legs, waist, hair and scalp) every two to three hours. Also check any gear or pets taken on outings.

Put your clothes in the dryer on high for 10 minutes (or one hour for damp clothes) to kill ticks.


Bathe or shower within two hours after coming indoors.

If you find a tick on yourself, it is often helpful to keep the tick for species identification.

Place the tick in rubbing alcohol or in a sealed bag/container to bring to your healthcare provider or local health department for submission to IDPH.

If you become ill with fever and/or rash after being in an area where ticks may have been, contact your health care provider.

Some tick-borne illnesses can be life-threatening. For example, if untreated Rocky Mountain spotted fever may cause death as quickly as five days after symptom onset.



Egyptian Area Agency on Aging working on plan to meet needs of seniors

(Editor's note: the following article was shared by Becky Salazar. Salazar is the executive director of the Egyptian Area Agency on Aging.)

The services and programs needed for older adults is important as the people in local communities are growing older each day.

The needs of older adults are also changing as "new" people assume the older adult role.

This new group comes from different experiences than its earlier counterparts and requires new programs and services to meet needs.

Add the complexities of a pandemic and fast-changing technology and the needs of older adults in a more rural community increase.

Traditional services and programs may not be enough to provide what a community needs for its older population.

Egyptian Area Agency on Aging is grateful for having the task of finding what the needs are of older adults and funding the appropriate services and programs to meet these needs.

Our agency is in the process of developing a three-

year area plan that will commit funding to several areas to address local needs.

Our agency held focus groups, conducted surveys online and in traditional paper form, and had live social media events to discern information on what the community believes is needed for older adults.

Our traditional programs that are essential and plan to be continued are home-delivered meals, congregate meals, information, assistance, outreach, senior center health promotion groups, with the addition of Matter of Balance, a fall prevention program, home modifications and transportation.

Our caregiver services appear to be needed and include respite, case-management, information, assistance, outreach, Savvy Caregiver groups and gap services.

These services can be found at your local senior centers. There is a senior center in each county knowledgeable of the services and resources for older adults.

In the future, we plan to put more emphasis in addressing social isolation. Many older adults have

identified themselves or others as lonely and needing more contact.

We plan to continue utilizing friendly calls, letter and card writing, as well as friendly visits when it is safe to do so.

We also plan to coordinate with community colleges to provide classes for older adults at senior centers on how to use technology, as this was a consistent need that was mentioned in surveys and focus groups.

Lastly, we will continue our Dementia Friendly Community efforts to go beyond Carterville and into other areas of Southern Illinois, so that persons with dementia and their caregivers feel supported by their community.

From the Wildcats' Lair

As we begin to emerge from the pandemic which has dominated our lives for the last 14 months, I thought I would take some time to update the community on what has been happening at your high school.

We just recently held our graduation ceremony for our seniors. We had a beautiful evening and we are thankful for those who were able to attend. After last year's restrictions, it was nice to see such a large gathering in person to honor our students.

We are also winding down our sports seasons, which were delayed this year due to the guidelines we were given by the state authorities.

While several seasons were shortened, we are grateful that all of the extracurricular activities were able to take place eventually. These opportunities play an important role in the overall well-being of our children.

As you know, this year's calendar and schedule was quite different from normal school years. The district attempted to do what was best for the kids, while still following the ever-changing guidelines from the Illinois State Board of Education and the Illinois Department of Public Health.

We realize that there were many different opinions on how to accomplish this. I do, however, want to say that I am proud of the entire school staff and their time, effort and dedication to the students and our school.

In addition, I understand that this was not only a difficult time for them, but also for our students and their families. I want to thank all of you for your patience, understanding and cooperation throughout the year.

With that said, I am happy to announce that, barring a sudden change in the current situation, we are planning to return to our normal schedule for next year. That means going to school five days a week with no early dismissal.

I am sure that I am not the only one that is happy to see remote learning become a thing of the past. This year has taught us the value of in-person instruction. Moving forward, remote learning will no longer be an option for our students, outside of a few, very limited medical exceptions.

This is also the time of the year when we begin to prepare for projects that will take place over the summer. With an aging building, there continues to be a need to update and make repairs on a regular basis.

We will continue our process of repairing the roof by replacing the Union Hall gym roof this summer. We have only one more section to replace after this.

We are also completely renovating the locker room area underneath Union Hall gym and adding air conditioning as well. You may also have noticed the new entrance into the building, as well as the remodeling of the principal's office. The old entrance into the school had been a security concern for many years.

My office has also relocated into the new district office building next to the school and includes new, additional parking spaces for after school events. We will also be putting a new surface on the running track.

The source of funding for these improvements comes from many different sources, including health life safety bonds, proceeds from the 1 percent sales tax and grants we have received due to the federal stimulus packages.

It is anticipated that more stimulus funds will be available and we are planning for the use of these funds, including adding air conditioning to the lower gym, improving our technology infrastructure, moving to a one-to-one device program next year, providing additional summer school opportunities and continuing to update and improve our facilities.
