Work underway at new PAWS facility

After years of planning, PAWS has officially begun construction on its new facility located on Dog Walk Road in Anna.

PAWS (Pets Are Worth Saving) is a no-kill animal shelter that has been a fixture in Anna since 2001 at its Vienna Street location, as well as a resale store located near the junction of Illinois Route 146 and old U.S. Route 51.

Construction on the new facility began earlier this summer with the preparation and leveling of the ground at the future location, as well as the laying of the gravel driveway and parking lot.

According to PAWS spokesperson Karee Sweitzer, putting up the fencing and laying out the plumbing are the next steps going forward.

The 7,000 square foot

facility will allow PAWS the room and resources to provide greater care and house more wayward animals in the region.

The new building will feature a large indoor play area, expanded kennel space and covered outdoor play yards.

Sweitzer says that the goal is to have the facility open and ready to serve the area by this winter, though much of the timetable will depend on funding.

Costs for the construction have largely come from donations from people and businesses in the Anna-Jonesboro community.

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



It seems we're hearing more and more stories in@ the news concerning "sexual reassignment." As with homosexuality and abortion, both of which are sins (Rom. 1:26-27; Prov. 6:16-18), this practice is gaining ground and being forced on society through the Liberal Agenda. Our concern with this should be, as always, "What does the Bible say?'

The Cache River Pirates

This story was published in newspapers nationally in 1830. It is the story of piracy in the area of the southern part of the Illi-nois Territory in a much earlier period.

The story is published in its entirety in the book, Six Years in the Illinois Territory, but is too lengthy to publish here. What follows is a much abridged version of the Cache River Pirates.

A man from one of the eastern states was much of a scoundrel where he lived. He appeared to be a much practiced gambler in his youth with a habit of win-

When he reached manhood, he entered into the militia and won the rank of Colonel. His earlier habits served only to land him in jail. He went by the name of Colonel Fluger.

He soon found his way down the Ohio River, landing at Fort Massac. From there, he made his way all the way to the Mississippi

As other flatboats came down the river, Colonel Fluger saw great opportunities in the goods that they carried with them. Among these people who came down the river, were a certain number that made their living the same way as Colonel Fluger. They all seemed to have a mysteriously attraction for one another and to the Colonel.

They soon began to prey on the naïve wayfarers, inviting them to drink and play cards, to the detriment of any who dared enter their abodes. Rumors began to spread up the river of the

gang of roughs that harmouth of Cache River. Even the scoundrels that also preyed on the people passing by Cave-in-Rock, or as it was known, the "House of Nature," knew of the pirates that awaited people at the mouth of the Cache. At the time of his highest fame, Colonel Fluger began to be known as Colonel "Plug."

The usual practice of this gang was to lure unsuspecting passersby to harbor at the mouth of the Cache for the night. They would then try to sneak on board at night and steal their goods. This failing, they would quietly go into the water and drill holes in the hulls of the flatboats or pry out the chinking, sinking the boats where they laid up for the

The stories were of a gang of thieves that lured river travelers into the deep swamps of the Cache, never to return again. The stories were described as "hairbristling stories of the knavery, cruelty and murders of the villans of the Cash," as it was most often known in that time.

The gang of thieves not only plied the waters of the Ohio River but made their way west to watch over opportunities that might arise from the Mississippi River as well. On one such occasion, a boat load of French and Spanish traders were descending the Mississippi from St. Louis to New Madrid, where they lived.

Landing at a spot nearly opposite of the Cache and camping for the night, they were drinking and smoking their pipes when Plug and his gang happened upon

Fearing Plug, perhaps from bored themselves at the his reputation, the French and Spanish cleared out immediately.

As they cleared away, they inadvertently left behind a woman who had stepped away from the group for a short stroll. This woman, described as a "giantess" in size and of a copper complexion, that appeared to have been the result of three races. It was said that her particular language, unknown to Plug and his gang, was a mixture of European, Negro and In-

Plug immediately saw a future for himself and the woman. The story of the Cache River Pirates, refers to her as a "quarteroon." The two immediately took up the same quarters and became as a married couple. She became known, without regard to what her name might have been in the beginning, as "Pluggy."

It is said that their abode was five miles up the Cache on the edge of a great swamp where had been built a log shelter. Their companions were wolves, panthers, moccasin snakes and millions upon millions of mosquitoes.

The writer of this story made note that the gang were so constantly in a drunken stupor, that if one of the poisonous snakes bit them, the snake would be the one to suffer. Such was the group that followed Plug and his lady, Pluggy.

Residents that lived along the Ohio River knew to be cautious along the river on its northern side.

A perspective on foreign policy issues

My brother Jerry has asked if I would be willing to periodically share a perspective on foreign policy issues. Of course, the focus of a local newspaper is rightfully on the local community and the people who live there. However, I agreed to give it a try for you readers to evaluate. He asked that at the outset I identify what credentials I might have to undertake such a project.

I was born in Anna and attended journalism training at Kansas State University to return home as editor of The Gazette-Democrat.

However with the conflict in Vietnam, I was soon drafted into the U.S. Army. I soon determined that this might be an interesting career and remained in uniform for 34 years, rising in rank from private to brigadier general.

This choice gave me many opportunities to experience life outside the United States. By the end of my military service I had served for five years in Germany, one in Vietnam, one in Korea and six and one-half years in The Soviet Union/Russia.

Continuing my education while in uniform, I was given four years of education at military institutions (largely in the Russian language) and was able to earn a civilian master's degree in Soviet studies and a PhD in international relations. In my "spare time" while in uniform, I taught for four years for the University of Maryland.

Following my military service, I served five years as the director of an international school for military personnel, with faculty and participants from 39 countries. Upon leaving that posting, I served five years at the Belfer Center at Harvard University as the executive director of research.

International news stories likely to affect your lives

1. Although far from resolved, the steps taken last week by the United States and the European Union to try to reduce the risk of a global trade war with one another by imposing significant tariffs and trade limitations seems to have diminished.

In earlier discussions it seemed likely that the United States was prepared to impose significant tariffs on steel and aluminum, key elements of American industry, while the European Community was exploring retaliatory tariffs to offset those the U.S. was considering.

Direct talks between the American president and the leader of the European Union, which focused on the significant downsides for both parties should a trade war become policy were ultimately persuasive for both sides.

International trade has achieved significant success in providing commercial and agricultural products desired by the other side at acceptable prices.

2. A second important international issue this week is a series of relatively short term steps to resolve the crisis created by the U.S. policy of separating children from their parents when they were attempting illegal entry into the United States. The U.S. courts and the court of public opinion have reviewed this policy and found it immoral and destructive.

Last week the U.S. president reviewed this program and announced that some 2,500 seized at the U.S. Mexican border would be reunited with their parents. Apparently by midweek the government confirmed that 1,820 reunions had been successfully accomplished.

Those parents remaining in the U.S. will still be required to appear before an immigration judge to determine if the reunited families could remain in the U.S. While the U.S. still is clearly concerned about the large number of people illegally crossing our southern border to enter the U.S., it has determined that separating children from their parents and holding the children in detention is not acceptable to the American populace.

3. A story that is hardly news anymore continues over shifting conflicts in the Middle East. Syria and Iran drew particular attention this past week. While the Syrian War has been long running the news report that captured public attention was the revelation that a large number of "rebels" the Syrian government claimed to have in detention had, in fact, been executed years ago. It is not yet known if the number of people executed numbers in the hundreds or thousands, but the trauma it has created for those families and for all others with friends and relatives reported to be in custody is immeasurable.

Splish, splash, they were taking a bath...or so that is what I was told by somebody who should know about such things.

Oh...to be a goose...in a pond...on a hot and humid summer afternoon in Southern Illinois...

...bear with me, dear readers. Once again this week, the focus is on critters. Feathered critters. Canada gooses, to be sure

Before we get to the topic at hand, let me revisit, one more time (and then we'll be done...maybe...) the Australian wood duck...black-bellied whisting duck...which have garnered way more attention than is probably necessary in this space over the past few weeks.

A fellow traveler on The Journey Through Life suggested, perhaps with tongue in cheek, that perhaps the bird I had spotted was a dodo. I thanked him for the observation, and suggested that the only dodo to be found at the moment was taking the picture of what was, at the time, a mystery creature.



After you're finished with a bath, it's time to dry out, which is what this goose seemed to be doing.

As you may know, dodo birds, like passenger pigeons, are no longer a part of the world around us. In a word, both of those critters are extinct. Thanks to people, I believe, but that is another story, for another time.

Now...about those gooses we were talking about...

...not long ago, yours truly paid an afternoon visit to one of his favorite haunts in Union County land. This particular place is home to a pond. The pond, in turn, has been the home of a family of Canada geese. (For now, we'll stop referring to them as gooses, just so the grammar police don't come after us.)

At the time of the visit, Mother Nature had blessed us with typical Southern Illinois summer time weather. As in it was really warm, no make that hot, and humid. Some folks might use the word sultry to describe the conditions.

While walking around the aforementioned pond, I happened to notice that the geese, which I have seen many times at this particular location, were in the water.

After I told him about the geese in the pond, he shared that they were bathing. Taking a goose bath, so to speak. I wonder if Canada geese have bright yellow rubber duckies to play with when they take a bath. Didn't see any rubber duckies at the time...



The Jonathan harvests will be followed by the picking of Red Delicious the second and third weeks of September and the Golden Delicious harvest expected the latter part of September.



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Home economics expert's peach recipes from 1939

(Note: the following article and recipes appeared in the Friday, Aug. 18, 1939, edition of The Democrat newspaper. The article was written by Eunice Larkin, a "Home Economics Expert" with Greater Weeklies of America." The article includes references to canning. Canning guidelines have changed over the years, which should be taken into consideration if you might consider using one of the recipes.)

Peaches

I hope I'm not too late with my peach recipe. I was shopping yesterday, and noticed the loveliest big peaches for canning. They are cheap enough now to buy by the bushel, and turn them into butter, jam, jelly and preserves.

Peach Pie

- 4 large peaches
- 2-3 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg 1-8 teaspoon salt

take out the stones. Cut into slices about one-fourth inch

1 teaspoon lemon juice

Peel the peaches and

Prepare a pie pastry, and line the pie pan. Place the slices of peaches in the pan and sprinkle with the rest of the dry ingredients. Dot with butter.

Cover with top crust, or with criss-cross slices of pastry. Bake at 425 degrees F for 10 minutes, then at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

Cocoanut-Peach Pud-

- 2 cups peaches
- 3-4 cup cocoanut
- 2 cups milk 1-4 cup cornstarch
- 1-3 cup sugar

Scald the milk in top of a double boiler. Mix the sugar and cornstarch and blend with the milk. Let cook until good and smooth and quite thick. Stir constantly

to prevent lumping. Fold in the peaches and the shredded cocoanut.

Peach Fruit Cup

- 6 large firm oranges 4 medium sliced peaches
- Powdered sugar

Prepare orange baskets. To do this, cut the orange in halves and remove the pulp. Cut the peaches and pulp in small cubes and fill the baskets. Sprinkle the top with the powdered sugar.

Peach Fluff

- 1 cup fresh peaches
- 3 eggs 2-3 cup sugar
- Grated rind of 1/2 lemon 1 1-3 tablespoons granu-
- lated gelatin
- 2 tablespoons cold water 4 tablespoons lemon

Sliced peaches

Beat the egg yolks until light, adding gradually the sugar and grated lemon

Place the peaches in sterilized jars. Boil the syrup for 10 minutes after removing the peaches. Fill the jars with syrup and seal.

An excellent flavor may be secured by placing a stick or two of cinnamon in each jar.

Peach Preserves 5 pounds peeled, sliced

- Juice of 2 lemons
- 5 pounds granulated

Boil water and sugar

together until the sugar is dissolved. Add the peaches which

are clear and tender. Cool the peaches and then pack in the jars. Reheat the syrup and pour over. Seal.

Peach-Pineapple De-

1 cup pineapple, canned

- 2 cups diced peaches 1 lemon, juice and rind,
- 1 orange, juice and rind,
- 1 cup blanched, chopped

Combine the ingredients with the exception of the nuts. Cook until thick and clear. Stir often to prevent

Add the chopped nuts and pour into sterilized jars. Seal.

Peach Butter

- 10 pounds peaches
- 4 pounds sugar 2 tablespoons ground
- 6 quarts sweet cider
- 2 tablespoons ground
- allspice 3 tablespoons ground

cinnamon Peel the peaches and remove stones. Cook with

the cider until tender. Force through a colander. Add spices and sugar and cook until thick.

Stir often to prevent burning. Pour into sterilized jars and seal.

Peach Jam

- 4 pounds peaches
- 2 pounds sugar



The residents of Cobden will be hearing a new sound, especially the Volunteer Fire Department. The 21 year old fire siren purchased in 1947 is being replaced with a new 5 hp, 3 phase unit. This should be quite an improvement over the 2 hp unit.

This project is being made possible by the Cobden Lions Club through funds from the Cobden Peach Festival and the Village of Cobden. The Fire Department also is grateful to CIPS for the help in the wiring change to a 3 phase service.

Illinois Central Railroad Plays Important Role in County History

The Illinois Central Railroad is the subject of this week's Early History of Union County. It was the building of this line that accounts for much of the prosperity and growth of the county, as well as the State of Illinois.

the railroad. Everyone remembered the failure of the plan for a state enterprise in 1837 which had created a \$17,000,000 debt, so after much discussion the decision was made to allow a private company to undertake the job.

According to Carlton J. Corliss' Story of Transportation Progress in Illinois, the charter and 2,595,000 acres of land was granted by the Illinois legislature to a group of promoters comprised of outstanding

In September 1850, Stebusiness leaders of New York and New England.

The land was to be every other section of land along the right-of-way which had not already been sold to the early settlers. In case of such land having already been sold, another section was substituted.

The charter which was granted gave them (the) authority to build and operate a railroad 705 miles long but made the following provisions, among these:

1. That the railroad should be completed within a period of six years.

2. That the railway lands should not be offered for sale until the Federal Government had disposed of all of its lands within a distance of six miles of the railroad at double the former price.

3. That the railway company would pay into the state treasury 7 cents out of every dollar received.

4. That the railroad would transport United States troops and property at one-half the standard passenger and freight rates.

It seems there was much ifference of opinion in Union County regarding the railroad.

There were many who thought the scheme would fail and that the old plank road and water transportation would provide prosperity for the area; others looked forward to the building of the road so they could take advantage of the opportunities the new mode of transportation would afford.

At a meeting held in Jonesboro, it was decided that Jonesboro was the only town that the railroad could pass through, (so) it would not be necessary to comply with the request of the company to make a survey of the route through town and donate their findings to the company. Such a survey cost fifty dollars.

However, Winstead Davie, a grocer and merchant, seemed to think the request was important and at his own expense, had such a survey made. But rather than having it made through Jonesboro he made it through his farmland a mile east of Jonesboro.

Then, when later, Jonesboro officials decided it was necessary to comply with the company's request, the Illinois Central had already accepted (the) survey presented to them by Davie.

As a result the railroad was laid, one mile east of Jonesboro, which at that time was one of the three

towns along the line to have a population of more than 100 inhabitants; Jonesboro had 584 inhabitants.

The building of the Illinois Central was responsible for the large increase in population of the towns.

The company advertised in newspapers (and) magazines, giving descriptions of the attractive land sites available in Illinois; also it advertised for workers in the eastern states and Europe, giving preference to men who came with their families in order to get them to remain after the road was built.

The first railroad was made of wooden rails upon which were fastened thin strips of iron to provide a running surface for the wheels. In the 1850s steel rails were introduced and later replaced the wooden ones.

Passenger cars on the Illinois roads in the 1850s would be curiosities today. They were built almost entirely of wood and most of them had four sets of wheels, two at each end. Seats were hard, lowbacked and uncomfortable. The cars were lighted by dim whale and coal oil lamps or flickering tallow candles and heated in winter with wood-burning stoves. Ventilation was poor and there were no screens on the windows.

The road was completed from Cairo to Sandoval (on) November 22, 1853, and many people from all parts of the country came to see the first passenger train pass through this part of the country.

According to a spokesman for a fruit and vegetable shipper, the unseasonably cool weather and heavy rains in the early part of the year have caused a delay in the harvest of fruits and vegetables.

The Lodi apple is approximately one week late, with shipping expected to commence sometime next week. Tomatoes and other vegetables normally being shipped at this time are also late.

Squash which is normally shipped has been discontinued due to poor markets for this vegetable.

The strawberry harvest has been completed with growers reporting the fruit as having been fairly good; although the rains also hampered the quality and quantity of some strawberries in the area this year.



Union County shippers report the peach harvest is completed, with the Elberta harvest having been finished last week. Shippers report they are now winding up the Rio Oso Gem

The quality of the peaches has been very good this season, however, the quantity has not been as good as in 1967 they report. Perhaps this is due to the extremely warm temperatures prevailing during the summer, and the cool spring when trees were beginning to bud.

The Jonathan apple harvest is scheduled to begin next week and shippers report this harvest should be good.

Warm temperatures beginning early in the summer with little rainfall throughout the summer prevented crops, such as corn, green beans, tomatoes, from maturing and being as of good quality and quantity as in former years.

The strawberry harvest this spring was also not as plentiful as in former years, although the quality was good.
