County extends COVID-19 disaster declaration

Union County officials Friday morning's meeting. have extended a disaster declaration which had been issued in April in response to the coronavirus/CO-VID-19 pandemic.

The declaration was one of the items on the agenda for a regular meeting of the Union County Board of Commissioners which was held Friday morning,

The meeting was in the community room at the Union County Courthouse in Jonesboro. The meeting also could be viewed live on the "County of Union, Illinois" YouTube page.

The impact of the ongoing pandemic also surfaced in connection with matters

Under the authority of the Illinois Emergency Management Act, on April 15, county board chairman Max Miller, upon the recommendation of Union County Emergency Management Agency co-

ordinator Dana Pearson,

proclaimed that a state of

disaster existed in Union

The proclamation was based on the following

"A significant outbreak of Corona Virus Disease (COVID-19) emerged in China and spread among residents in the United States. The virus has spread throughout Union County which were discussed at and we continue to prepare

and address any situation ic no longer exists in the as necessary and appropriate to protect the health and safety of the citizens. Resources have been utilized from Federal, State, County and Municipalities to mitigate and minimize the response effort."

The declaration continued: "As county officials, we recognize the impact this disaster has had on the County of Union, and the citizens that live here. Due to continuing efforts in the response of said disaster, it is hereby resolved by the Union County Board of Commissioners, Union County, Illinois that the declaration declared on April 15, 2020 is hereby extended until this pandemCounty of Union, Illinois."

Board chairman Miller again asked the people of Union County to heed what is being asked, and not mandated, in terms of responding to the pandemic, such as wearing a face mask and practicing social distancing.

The board chairman reminded everyone to be aware of, and considerate of, others.

Union County Board vice chairman Bobby Toler Jr. reported that online certification is being made available for dispatchers who work for the joint Union and Alexander counties emergency 911 communication system. Online certification is being made available in response to the pandemic.

Toler also reported that Shawnee Development Council had moved its Union County food pantry back to the Choate Mental Health and Developmental Center in Anna.

The food pantry had been moved to the First Baptist Church in Jonesboro due to the pandemic. Toler voiced appreciation to the Jonesboro church for allowing the food pantry to utilize its facilities.

Toler also noted that the pantry had made food available to just over 1,000 people in Union County during July.

350 cases in county

The number of CO-VID-19 cases in Union County climbed to 350 as of Monday, Aug. 17.

Southern Seven Health Department on Monday confirmed 31 new cases of COVID-19 in the region it serves in Southern Illinois. Twenty-two of the cases were in Union County.

The health department reported the death of another person from Union County as a result of CO-VID-19. The person was a male in his 60s.

The health department reported that the newly confirmed cases, by county, gender and age, included:

Union County: one female in her 10s, four females in their 20s, one male in his 30s, four females in their 40s, eight males in their 40s, one female in her 50s, one male in his 50s, one female in her 60s and one male in his 70s.

Alexander County: one female in her 10s, one female in her 30s.

Johnson County: one female in her 20s, one female in her 30s, one male in his 60s, one female in her 70s, one male in his 70s.

Massac County: one female in her 30s, one male

Union County remains at warning level for coronavirus disease

Union County remained at a warning level for the novel coronavirus disease (COVID-19) as of Friday, Aug. 14.

The Illinois Department of Public Health, IDPH, on Friday reported that 14 counties in the state are considered to be at a warning level for novel coronavirus disease (COVID-19).

A county enters a warning level when two or more COVID-19 risk indicators that measure the amount of COVID-19 increase.

As of Friday, 14 Illinois counties were reported at a warning level, including Union, Bureau, Cass, Clinton, Franklin, Greene, Grundy, Hancock, Jefferson, Kane, LaSalle, Moultrie, Perry and Will.

These counties saw cases or outbreaks associated with weddings, businesses, birthday parties, long-term care facilities and other congregate settings, bars,

sports camps and spread among members of the same household.

Public health officials are seeing people in some communities are not wearing masks, or if they are, they are being worn incorrectly.

IDPH stated that local health departments are finding it challenging to obtain the information necessary to halt local transmission, by quickly identifying exposures from contacts of cases and businesses.

The department also said in a news release that "inconsistent messaging from local elected leaders are contributing to ongoing transmission in some communities where there is little public concern for consequences or enforcement of social distancing, banning large gatherings, or quarantine/isolation orders.

Several counties were taking swift action and implementing mitigation measures to help slow spread of

Examples include increasing the availability in testing in their community and working with local businesses to educate and spot check mask wearing and guideline adherence.

Census Bureau workers will follow CDC and local public health guidelines when they visit.

Census takers must complete a virtual COVID-19 training on social distancing protocols and other health and safety guidance before beginning their work in neighborhoods.

Census takers are hired from local communities. All census takers speak English, and many are bilingual.

If a census taker does not speak the householder's language, the household may request a return visit from a census taker who does. Census takers also will have materials on hand to help identify the household's language.

If no one is home when a census taker visits, then the census taker will leave a notice about the visit, along with information on how to respond online, by phone or by mail.

Southern Seven encourages everyone to cooperate with census takers to ensure that everyone who was living in their household as of April 1, 2020, is counted.

Census takers can be easily identified by a valid government ID badge which has their photograph, a U.S. Department of Commerce watermark and an expiration date on the badge.

To confirm a census taker's identity, the public can contact their regional census center to speak with a Census Bureau representative.

The U.S. Constitution mandates a census of the nation's population every 10 years.

The goal of the 2020 census is to count everyone who lived in the United States on April 1, 2020, which was Census Day.

Census statistics are used to determine the number of seats each state holds in the U.S. House of Representatives and informs how billions of dollars in federal funds will be allocated by state, local and federal lawmakers annually for the next 10 years.

As of Aug. 17, the census response rate in Union County was 66.0 percent. At the same time in 2010, the county's response rate was 68.8 percent.

The Union County response rate remained the highest among the seven counties served by the health department.

There will be several computers on site that can be used for submitting the 2020 census electronically.

Any assistance needed in filling out the census will be provided, including an on-site Spanish translator.

The event will feature free food, many giveaways, fliers and information, along with a \$50 gift card drawing for those who submit their survey at the event.

The grant funds awarded to the Southern Illinois agency will be used to strengthen and expand prevention, treatment and recovery services for substance use disorders, including opioid use disorder, in Hardin County and Pope

The art should be no smaller than 8 inches by 10 inches, but no larger than 18 inches by 24 inches.

Three dimensional art can use such mediums as paper, papier-mache, pottery, clay and metal work.

Pieces should be no smaller than 8 inches in any direction and no larger than 24 inches. Art cannot be more than 5 pounds in weight.

Digital art, photography and jewelry will not be accepted.

No spectators (including parents) are allowed in the dugouts.



County clerk shares update about election information

an update about vote by mail applications for the 2020 general election, which is scheduled in November.

The county clerk's office oversees the election process. Meisenheimer reported that through Friday, Aug. 14, a total of 586 vote by mail (VBM) applications had been

The list will be updated every Friday and will be on the county website under the "Election Info" tab and will be called "Vote by Mail Request List."

This is for people to check and see if we have received their VBM application or to make sure that person is not on the VBM list, the county clerk said.

"We've had some questions about the new process, but most people are understanding it now after we explain the process," the county clerk said.

New this year is that early voting is scheduled to take place in the community room at the Union County Courthouse in Jonesboro.

"I decided to move it there to separate the office staff from the election judges and voters so that if by chance there is a COVID-19 exposure in either room, we can then

The other \$4,131.13 will be used quickly and the clerk said he set aside some of the CARES Act Grant money to

much it will be until we know how many voters request to vote by mail."

"We were awarded \$31,389.93 from the State Board of Elections for the CARES Act. We know we have spent \$24,166 on items and supplies needed for this election and there will be more as we get closer. I'm left with \$7,223.93 to help pay for the postage of the ballots and more supplies that we will need but all of the ballots will have postage paid on them," he said.

Meisenheimer said the number of election judges per precinct also can be reduced to three, instead of five, according to the new state law.

He said that almost all of the judges who worked in the March primary election have stated they will work again.

"I will still try to fill most of the precincts with five, but in some of the smaller ones we might just have three,"he

The county clerk said he has purchased 150 face masks for each precinct.

Anheuser-Busch is donating hand sanitizer to every precinct in the whole State of Illinois.

"I cannot require everyone to wear a mask and hopefully most people will have a mask, but we are highly encouraging everyone to wear a mask at the polls."

State COVID-19 cases top 200,000

SPRINGFIELD – As of last week, Illinois had recorded more than 200,000 cases of COVID-19 since the pandemic first arrived in the state.

The Illinois Department of Public Health, IDPH, reported Thursday, Aug. 13, that there had been 1,834 new confirmed cases of the disease over the previous 24 hours, the highest singleday total since Saturday, Aug. 8.

The Aug. 13 statistics brought the statewide total number of cases to 200,427, or nearly 1.6 percent of the state's population.

The department also reported 24 additional virus-related deaths since Wednesday, Aug. 12, which brought the statewide total to 7,696.

The rising number of cases came at a time when K-12 schools, colleges and universities are struggling to decide whether to resume in-person classes, continue remote learning or some combination of both.

"I'm deeply concerned about the direction that the numbers are going across the State of Illinois," Gov. JB Pritzker said during a public appearance in Bloomington on Aug. 13.

"I'm also deeply concerned to make sure that we do as much as we can to provide the proper education for our kids.

"We all know from all the studies that in-person learning is better than e-learning in terms of the retention by kids for what they're learning about.

"And so, you know, I'm hopeful that schools across the state have the ability to offer in-person learning as well as e-learning. But I understand when schools have chosen to go all e-learning because the challenge is

great." As of Wednesday night, Aug. 12, 1,628 COVID-19 patients in Illinois were

hospitalized. Of those, 383 patients were in intensive care units, and 127 of those patients were on ventilators. That's the highest hospitalization number since July 1, and the highest ICU number

since June 30. The 1,834 new cases confirmed on Aug. 13 were from 46,006 tests performed, which is a oneday positivity rate of just

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



Jimmie C. Courtright, 93, of Jonesboro, died Tuesday, Aug. 11, 2020, at his home.


He was born on April 12, 1927, in Jonesboro, the son of Horace and Minnie Bullard Courtright.

Our Union County Roots

Our Union County Roots is a monthly column by the Union County Historical and Genealogy Society. The society owns and operates the Union County Museum in Cobden. Check them out on Facebook at Union County, IL Historical and Genealogy Society & Museum.

In 1977, Glenn J. Sneed of Royalton published a 309 page book called "Ghost Towns of Southern Illinois." Included in the book were the 17 southernmost counties of the region. He traveled over 100,000 miles during the five-year period he was researching the book and he estimated that he talked to at least 3,000 people.

Mr. Sneed, a retired teacher, could not get anyone interested in publishing his findings. So, he spent his own money to have the hard back book published because he strongly believed in the preservation of the history of the many small villages and towns that no longer existed.

Marketing the book, once published, was equally difficult. He found little interest. He gave presentations throughout the area in hopes of selling his book and recouping some of his life savings. The Historical Society hosted a book signing at Stinson Library in Anna.

He readily admitted that the book was not without problems, but lacking someone to proofread the book he decided to publish what he had.

Mr. Sneed, unfortunately, did not live to see his book become one of the most highly sought after books on Southern Illinois history. The book was eventually published in soft back, but that, too, is hard to find.

Sneed also cautioned the reader that there was no doubt more settlements that had disappeared that he was unable to document.

We have found two such settlements: Morgan Town and Benderville.

Morgan Town

G.W. Morgan in partnership with his son, Sam, established a new settlement one and one-half miles east of Dongola in the spring of 1870. The called the settlement Morgan Town.

A paragraph in the Dongola News in the October 21, 1871, issue of the Jonesboro Gazette described the flourishing settlement as consisting of a combination flour and saw mill and a dry goods and grocery store.

Mr. Morgan was described as a good businessman as well as an honest and upright citizen. His son, Sam, was touted as a talented young man with a good head for business.

The Dongola correspondent noted that G.W. Morgan and his son processed and shipped large quantities of some of the best lumber in Union County. However, the partnership of George W. Morgan and Son was dissolved in late 1871 by mutual consent.

George continued to operate the flour and saw mill and kept the grocery and dry goods business open at least through 1872. Morgan Town did not have a post office and was never incorporated.

Benderville

Benderville is situated about six miles from Dongola and owned by B.F. Livingston and E. Leavenworth according to an account in the January 6, 1872, issue of the Jonesboro Gazette. These men had moved their dry goods stock from Dongola to their sawmill six miles east of the town in September of 1871.

According to the Dongola correspondent for the Gazette, these men were running one of the best lumber mills in the county, making boat timber and plow and wagon timber by the score. Working with Livingston and Leavenworth were George Little and a Mr. Butler who was the clerk.

Charles Hammonds, one of the best sawyers in the country, was in charge of the mill.

The thriving village with a population of 100 had a store, a mill, a boarding house, and a blacksmith shop. Cattle and oxen numbered about 80, hogs 30, horses 10, frogs 50 bushels to the acre and 50 million fleas.

The New Years dance was a success and the house was filled with the fair sex. The music was furnished by H. Tripp and B.F. Livingston who had the reputation of being first class fiddlers.

The Rev. Mr. S. Brewer of Murphysboro was holding a revival at the Union Church.

Benderville did not have a post office and was never incorporated.


