
Sheriff issues monthly report

Saturation Saturday initiative planned by Illinois State Police

Illinois State Police District 22 will be participating in a Saturation Saturday enforcement effort.

Capt. Michael Alvey, the commander of District 22, announced plans for the initiative. Union County is in District 22.

The initiative is set to occur on Saturday, Aug. 25, in conjunction with the Labor Day Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign, which began Aug. 20 and continues through Sept. 4. Labor Day is Sept. 3.

Saturation Saturday is a statewide initiative with Mothers Against Drunk Driving which is designed to raise awareness about the dangers of drunk and increase enforcement to remove and arrest individuals driving under the influence.

Troopers across the state will join county and local law enforcement agencies for increased enforcement friends drive impaired. during the evening nours of Aug. 25 and early morning hours of Aug. 26.

"District 22 will use directed patrols and dedicate personnel to DUI enforcement to support this enforcement initiative," Alvey said in a news release.

Fall and winter landscaping in Southern Illinois will be the topic of a program which is planned Monday, Aug. 27, in Carbondale.







New law allows blaze pink clothing for hunters in Illinois Legislation which legal- Louisiana, Minnesota, New Illinois Legislative Sports-

izes blaze pink hunting gear and increases penalties for wildlife poaching in Illinois has been signed into law.

House Bill 4231 permits hunters to wear blaze pink clothing in addition to blaze orange.

Both colors of clothing are equally visible to the human eye; however, deer are believed to be color blind to red and can see very little orange or pink.

The legislation was signed Aug. 18 by Gov. Bruce Rauner.

"We want to make sure that Illinoisans are able to hunt and enjoy the outdoors safely," Rauner said.

"The new legislation provides more variety in hunting gear while preventing tragic hunting accidents in Illinois."

Blaze orange clothing has been credited for a reduction in hunting-related injuries and deaths.

"Blaze pink can be easier to see, making it a safer option when hunters are in fields or woods," said State Sen. Neil Anderson, R-Andalusia, who sponsored the legislation in the Senate.

"At the same time, many believe deer can't see the pink color. Giving hunters this option will only enhance their hunting experience and improve safety."

Wisconsin, Colorado,

York and Virginia have also authorized fluorescent pink as an alternative color to

"Blaze pink laws have already passed in several other states, so this change in the law sends the message that our hunting laws put safety first," said State Rep. Dave Severin, R-Benton, lead House sponsor of

"This action gives the consumer a choice, and though I'm no fashion expert, I believe blaze pink will look good on sportsmen and women in Southern Illinois.'

'As a lifelong hunter and supporter of the Second Amendment, I was proud to help sponsor this important safety measure," said State Rep. Terri Bryant, R-Murphysboro, House co-sponsor of the bill.

'Though I am quite partial to the color pink, the scientific research I have seen shows that people see the color pink better than the color orange. I am grateful that the governor recognizes the importance of hunting safety and that hunting is an important part of the culture and a tourism driver for Southern Illinois.'

The initiative was supported by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, IDNR, and the tive immediately.

men's Caucus. The new law

takes effect Jan. 1, 2019. House Bill 5317 requires people who illegally capture or kill white-tailed antlered deer to pay restitution

to IDNR. White-tailed deer are the state mammal of Illinois and a crucial part of our ecology. We must manage the deer population responsibly so future generations of Illinoisans can enjoy Illinois' wildlife," Rauner said.

"Poaching is a serious crime and should be punished accordingly. Illegal hunting hurts legitimate sportsmen, deprives the state and local businesses of revenue generated from hunting, and harms Illinois' wildlife population.'

Supported by IDNR, the bill also raises the replacement value of a variety of wildlife species. These values are used to determine the legal and financial penalties for commercial hunting in violation of the Illinois Wildlife Code.

"Hopefully, the increase in penalties will discourage and minimize the need to kill animals for profit while increasing the value of our wildlife," said State Sen. Napoleon Harris, D-Harvey, who sponsored the legislation.







SIX YEARS IN THE ILLINOIS TERRITORY, 1812-1818 WHEN JOHNSON COUNTY SPANNED RIVER TO RIVER

Welfare of the Poor

The law of the Illinois Territory provided for the poor in each county. Each township had "Overseers of the Poor" appointed from the beginning of Johnson County. Although their duties were not defined, it was obvious that they were to see that no person perished for lack of subsistence.

One of the strangest stories concerning the poor was that of Richard York and his wife. In a case about hog thievery, looking at the testimony from Samuel Simmons, he (Simmons) stated that Charles Mick had purchased hogs from Richard York. Why York sold his hogs has not been definitely determined but it may be because he was in a destitute state and needed help. Looking at information gleaned from these records, it becomes evident that York was most likely ill and could not care for himself and his wife at that

The next time Richard York shows up chronologically is just after Pope County was separated from Johnson County. county being young, its first Court was held at the house of Thomas Ferguson on April 1, 1816. On August 28, 1816, the Pope County Court issued the following

"Ordered that Hezekia Haile and Robert Scott overseers of the poor in Centre Township of this County, farm out Richard York and his wife at Sarahsville on the last day of the Election next at this place, to the lowest bidder from this time to the 1st Monday in May next."

The idea of farming out these people was to allow someone to care for them and get whatever work they could from them. Their sponsor would receive money from the county for their service.

Not long after this, specifically on February 24, 1817, an order came out of the Court at Pope County, stating that Samuel Simmons should be allowed \$15.00 for transporting Richard York and his wife

to Johnson County.

Meanwhile, back in
Johnson County Court, on October 8, 1816, that Court issued the following state-

"Whereas a certain Richard York and Susannah his wife (paupers) have lately been sent into this county from the county of Pope by order of the overseers of the poor of that county as it appears – and whereas the said Richard & Susannah have never herefore gained a legal settlement in this county whereby they ought to become chargable to the same as paupers ordered that the overseers of the poor for the Township of Elvira cause the said Richard York and Susannah his wife to be reconveyed to the county of Pope from wherein they were brought."

Johnson County appeared not too pleased to have Pope County dumping their poor on them. Their answer to that was to send them back to Pope. Let their Overseers of the Poor take care of this family.

Before Johnson could send Richard York back, he died. Johnson County paid for the care of the Yorks and for the funeral expenses of Richard York. Bradshaw took Susannah York and her son back to Pope County shortly after the death of her husband.

John Bradshaw was paid six dollars for taking care of York, his wife and

son for two weeks. He was also paid an additional four dollars for caring for Susannah York and her son after the death of Richard. He is also paid two dollars for funeral expenses including a coffin. He charged three dollars for taking them back to Pope County; considerably less than Samuel Simmons received for bringing them to Johnson. Bradshaw's wife, Mary, made funeral clothes for York and received six dollars for her

Richard York was not the only encounter with the poor of the area. Orphan children were a problem and had to be cared for.

Overseers of the poor also had to see that orphaned children were cared for by someone or some Most orphaned family. children were cared for by neighbors and relatives. Quite often pioneer households had children living with them that did not belong to their immediate family. The Court seldom had to step in. There were cases, however, that drew the attention of the Court. The Courts always found homes and care for these children.

The poor of Old Johnson County that are enumerated in the book published by the Annables are too numerous to list here.

Elizabeth Elkins and children needed aid when the father of the family deserted them.



Southern Illinois man among five inductees into state Outdoor Hall of Fame

Hall of Fame will welcome as new inductees five individuals with records of exemplary service in and commitments to improving conservation efforts and outdoor recreation opportunities in Illinois.

The Illinois Conservation Foundation, ICF, on Aug. 18 announced the inductees. One of the hall of fame members is from Southern Illinois.

The new hall of fame members were recognized during a presentation at Conservation World at the Illinois State Fair in Springfield on Saturday morning, Aug. 18.

They also will be honored at an Illinois Outdoor Hall of Fame Gala, which is planned Sept. 21 in Springfield.

Since 2002, the ICF has recognized Illinoisans for their significant contributions and unparalleled dedication in preserving, promoting, enhancing or supporting natural resources and outdoor recreation opinto the Illinois Outdoor Hall of Fame.

Steve Widowski of Vienna is one of the hall of fame inductees.

IDNR stated that Widowski dedicated most of his professional career serving as a wildlife biologist for the U.S. Forest Service in the Shawnee National Forest in Southern Illinois.

His influence in enhancing wildlife habitat and outdoor recreation opportunities extends well beyond the forest in Southern Illinois.

The Chicago native was instrumental in the development, restoration and management of much of the critical wildlife habitat on the Shawnee, including the Big Muddy Bottomlands and the Oakwood Bottoms Greentree Reservoir, which provides an important migration and wintering area for waterfowl.

Widowski took the lead in coordinating a partnership involving the Forest Service, the HeartLands Con-

The Illinois Outdoor portunities with induction servancy, Ducks Unlimited and other conservation partners to acquire high-priority sites in the Mississippi River floodplain and to restore thousands of acres of wetland and bottomland forest habitat across Southern Illinois.

Now retired from the Forest Service, Widowski continues to work to protect and manage natural resources in the region as a special projects coordinator for the HeartLands Conservancy.

The new inductees also include Diane Banta of Chicago, Sylvan (Jerry) Beverlin of Petersburg, David F. Grohne of Wilmington and Sam Oliver of Barrington.

The Illinois Conservation Foundation is a not-for-profit corporation which was established in 1995 to help support the mission and programs of the Illinois Department of Natural Resources.

The ICF works to inspire young people by providing outdoor education and programs that instill interest in conservation, ecology and sustainability.

The bill, initiated by

AARP, provides specifics on the council's membership, powers and duties. The council will be administered by the Illinois

Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity, DCEO.

Just under four in 10 people ages 65 and older have high-speed internet access in their homes, compared to 77 percent of the 30- to 49-year-old demographic, according to AARP Illinois' most recent data.

Many seniors need broadband access to benefit from web-based technologies that support aging in place, such as telehealth and "smart home" systems.

Other uses include selfmanagement of chronic diseases that can help prevent or postpone functional decline, such as home-based smart medical services.

State Sen. Jil Tracy, R-Quincy, said that signing of the bill was "a positive step forward for those rural communities in Illinois that have had limited internet connectivity, they've been under-served and held back.

"In today's world, this is a basic utility. I'm grateful we're broadening our horizons and recognizing that everyone needs reliable access to this vital tool."

The ability to work parttime from home online could be particularly valuable to older adults who are facing growing demands to manage complex health, retirement and care arrangements.

The bill was supported by AARP of Illinois, AT&T, the Illinois Farm Bureau, the Illinois Municipal League, the Illinois Telecommunications Association, the Illinois Department on Aging DCEO.

House Bill 4424 eases the renewal requirements for Illinois identification cards for the state's seniors.

It provides that identification cards issued to Illinoisans over 65 are permanent and do not need to be renewed. ID cards issued to those 65 and older will continue to be free of charge.

The bill also provides that Illinois Person with a Disability ID cards will expire after 10 years.

The initiative was supported by the Illinois secretary of state and the AARP.



Thoughts on the world and issues that will affect our local communities

A number of unfortunate conditions ran through the media last week, and while they were generally stories about events and places far away, each of them casts a shadow on our own future that we need to understand to avoid.

Turkey, a U.S. ally in Europe, has spent itself into a very difficult position. Over the last week the value of the Turkish lira has dropped by 20 percent.

Clearly that makes it far more difficult to buy American products and greatly concerns American investors who have been seeking to gain income from investments in Turkey.

The interest rates, or return on investments, in recent times has been relatively low in the United States, causing investors to seek a better return in "developing" countries like Turkey.

Furthermore, based on predictions involving Turkey, which were until recently rosy, the sudden drop in the value of the lira may not be the last, or even the largest.

As American investment advisors seek higher returns, the corollary may be higher risks. In recent years the "wealthy" nations, such as the United States, Europe and Japan, have lent billions of dollars to governments in developing nations.

Despite more than a decade of intense effort, the U.S. strategy of training and equipping local forces in the Middle East and Afghanistan to take over the fight against ISIS and the Taliban, the results are at best mixed.

While the United States has made a major commitment to the fight in dollars and lives of U.S. servicemen, it is reported that our morale is low when Americans serving there observe large numbers of our "allies" surrendering. Some ask that, if after more than a decade of service in Afghanistan, we remain close to the same point where we began, is it likely to get much better?

Other forms of corruption and incompetence can lead to greater frustration. In a recent case, an Iraqi spy, who had spent months providing information from inside an ISIS camp was discovered and executed by ISIS.

Despite stories of his significant contributions to Iraqi intelligence agencies, and despite his death a year ago, his widow and children have not been able to collect his authorized pension. Bureaucrats in Bagdad have insisted the family produce his corpse to prove he died. For reasons that are obvious, ISIS has been unwilling to cooperate with the family of this successful spy by returning his body.

In Italy a major elevated bridge through Genoa collapsed last week, reigning death and destruction to those below the major thoroughfare.

A major investigation is now ongoing to determine how such a major thoroughfare in an urban area could reach such a degree of disrepair that it completely and suddenly collapsed.

Obviously the Italian authorities failed to take sufficient steps to identify early the degradation of the bridge before the tragedy. Hopefully U.S. and our local officials will learn an important lesson and assure that the next collapse of a bridge or major infrastructure project is better monitored and cared for as it ages.
