A sliver of a crescent moon appeared in the sky Friday evening, Jan. 19, in the sky over a cross atop St. Joseph Catholic Church in Cobden.

The new electronic sign in front of Anna Junior High/Davie School in Anna showed a midday temperature of 62 degrees on Monday.

Students, by the way, were back in school Monday after an unscheduled "vacation" of sorts due to last week's icy and bitter cold conditions in Union County.

Gusts of up to 40 miles per hour were possible in the area on a windy Monday in the region. The National Weather Service reported a 52 mph gust Monday at the Southern Illinois Airport near Carbondale.

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2017 Anna police activities reported

Anna Police Chief Mike Hunter has released reports highlighting activities for the year 2017 and the months of November and December of last year.

The number of traffic accidents covered by the Anna Police Department during 2017 were reviewed.

The department's monthly activities for November and December were reported. The activities of assistant police chief and detective Bryan Watkins also were reviewed.

2017 Traffic Accidents

During 2017, a total of 161 accidents were reported. Thirteen accidents involved injuries. Eighteen people sustained injuries.

Property damage occurred in 148 of the accidents which were reported last year.

Assistant Chief's Report

The following activities

were reported during November and December by Assistant Police Chief/Detective Watkins:

November

Computers donated to Anna School District 37

Organizers note that benefits of the program, which was developed at Stanford University, include:

Reduction of days in the hospital. Reduction of emergency room visits. Increased feeling of control of your life. Increased energy levels. Significantly improved overall health status.

A-JCHS student honored for life-saving actions

A Union County high school student has been honored for actions he took which saved the life of a Texas man.

Kyle McMahan, 16, of Anna, was presented with a Life Saving Award during a ceremony which was held Jan. 17 at the Union County Sheriff's Office in Jonesboro.

The award was presented by Union County Sheriff Scott Harvel. McMahan, who is a junior at Anna-Jonesboro Community High School, was honored by the Union County Sheriff's Office and the Illinois State Police.

The award declared that McMahan was honored: "In Recognition of Your Actions that Resulted in a Life Saving Event that Occurred on December 20, 2017. Your Quick Thinking in Calling 911 and Staying with the Victim Until Help Arrived Went Above and Beyond the Maturity of a 16-Year-Old and Speaks Volumes to Your Character."

Sheriff presents award to student

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Student honored

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Harvel said that the honor was the first of its kind that he has presented while serving as Union County sheriff.

Those in attendance at the ceremony included McMahan, members of his family, the Union County sheriff, Illinois State Police and other emergency services personnel.

McMahan was credited with taking life-saving action after he stopped at the scene of an accident which was reported at about 10 p.m. on Dec. 20 along Interstate 57 east of Anna.

Union County Sheriff Scott Harvel said that McMahan had driven by the scene of the accident, saw what had happened, turned around and went back. The sheriff said that McMahan's quick thinking and response most likely were life-saving actions.

"I think it's great to see that we have caring people in our community," Harvel said.

McMahan admitted to being a bit nervous about the attention he was receiving and was modest in explaining the steps he took to help the man.

"It was what you need to do," he told those in attendance at the Jan. 17 ceremony. "It should be in your make-up."

"It shouldn't take too much to help somebody," he added. "I'm just glad he's OK," he said about the driver.

A Union County Sheriff's Office incident report detailed what happened on that cold December night.

On Dec. 20, at approximately 10:10 p.m., a 911

call came to the sheriff's office in Jonesboro "stating that a vehicle was off of the interstate in a wooded area."

Upon arrival at exit 30 along I-57, the report stated that vehicle lights could be seen in the wooded area between the off ramp and the interstate.

The sheriff's office's responding officer "met with a young man named Kyle McMahan. Kyle called in the vehicle and began giving (the responding officer) the information that he gathered. Kyle stated that he did not see the incident happen, he was just driving by and (had) seen the lights in the woods."

The responding officer observed "a truck in the woods, and the driver pinned in the truck by his head. The rest of his body

was outside of the vehicle." Medical and rescue emergency services personnel had been notified about the incident and were en route to the scene.

"The driver was talking and begging for someone to remove the truck," the incident report continued.

The responding officer informed the driver that help was on the way and a few more people were needed "to get the truck off of him."

Once more emergency services personnel arrived at the scene, the driver, a 71-year-old man from Longview, Texas, was removed from the vehicle.

After the driver had been moved to an ambulance, he explained what had happened.

The driver stated that he had stopped on the side of

the interstate ramp to refuel his truck.

"His truck began to roll and he attempted to stop it. He stated that his pants were loose and fell down his legs, tripping him, and he began to get dragged."

The driver was transported to Union County Hospital in Anna. From there, he transferred by Air Evac helicopter to St. Francis Medical Center in Cape Girardeau.

The Union County Sheriff's Office, Illinois State Police, Union County Rescue and the Union County Ambulance Service responded to the call.

During last week's ceremony, the sheriff said that he had been trying to contact the Texas man who was involved in the accident, but was not able to do so.

State senator reviews activities in district

A Southern Illinois legislator spent the week of Jan. 15-19 in the 59th District celebrating the legacy of Martin Luther King Jr., meeting with representatives from the Illinois State Police and speaking with Pulaski Mayor Dean Rogan.

King Tribute

In celebrating the life of "one of our nation's most notable social activists," State Sen. Dale Fowler, R-Harrisburg, said he came together with members and officials of the NAACP of Alexander and Pulaski counties on Martin Luther King Jr. Day, which was Jan. 15, for a prayer breakfast.

Fowler spoke at the event, remembering the legacy, influence and life of a man who helped lead and shape the civil rights movement.

Illinois State Police

In preparation for the spring legislative session,

Fowler met with representatives of the Illinois State Police to discuss some of their issues, thoughts and concerns.

He learned more about staff shortages within the agency, as well as ongoing efforts by the state police to address distracted driving on the Illinois roadways.

Fowler also mentioned a number of issues brought to the table during his previous Agricultural and Trucking Committees, including axle weight limits in Illinois.

Fowler said in a news release that he is looking forward to continuing these types of conversations in the future, learning more about the collective needs of those in the district to help represent their interests in state government.

Meeting with Mayor

Furthering his efforts to get input and feedback from local communities, Fowler met with Pulaski Mayor Dean Rogan.

Fowler met the local leader and business owner at his pharmacy, Rogan's Country Pharmacy, to get an update on some of the needs within the community, including ongoing infrastructure problems and ways to address the issues.

Fowler also attended the West Frankfort Chamber of Commerce's 75th annual awards dinner to celebrate the accomplishments of the organization from the previous year and honor the recipients of awards like the business of the year and West Frankfort citizen of the year.

Human Trafficking Awareness

In other news, January is Human Trafficking Awareness Month.

In 2017 alone, 100 cases of human trafficking in Illinois were reported to the National Human Trafficking Hotline, but undoubtedly, many more cases went

General Assembly

With lawmakers gearing up to head back to Springfield, bills are already being filed for consideration when the Illinois General Assembly reconvenes at the end of January.

Earlier in January, two measures were announced, including a measure that calls for the expansion of high-speed Internet to rural schools and a bill that would give Illinois motorists the option of registering their vehicles for more than one year at a time.

The Power of God's Forgiveness

In Bible times, when an individual owed another a sum of money, they would take a stone, or piece of pottery, and engrave the amount that was owed on the face of the stone or pottery, and the engraving remained as long as the amount was owed. But when the sum was paid in full, wax would be melted and poured over the face of the stone and the engraving would be filled in – or "covered up," and the debt was settled. From that cultural background, the Psalmist says, "Blessed is the man whose sin is covered" (Ps. 32:1-2). Sin is a debt I owe and as the song says, a debt I could not pay. Thus, Jesus said in Matt. 6 how we are to forgive men their debts. So, sin is a debt. It's like an engraving on the face of the stone, but with forgiveness, the debt – the engraving – is covered over – not with wax, but with the very blood of Jesus! (Rom. 5:9): "Being therefore justified by His blood, we shall be saved from the wrath of God through Him."

So, first of all, sin – being forgiven – is like having my sins (the debt I owe to God) engraved on the face of a stone. But with forgiveness, the blood of Jesus is poured over the face of the stone and makes its way into the engraving and covers it up, so that I owe the debt of my transgression against God no more.

Furthermore, in Isaiah 1:18, the Bible says, "Come now, and let us reason together, saith the Lord. Though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow. They shall be as wool." In this passage, sin is set before us as a stain, and forgiveness as the stain being removed. Now, think about that stone in Bible times that would represent the debt owed. So first of all, my transgression is engraved on the face of the stone, second, it is covered over by the blood of Jesus – but wait: even though the engraving has been filled & covered over by the blood of Jesus, the stain is still there. You can see where the engraving has been covered over by the crimson blood of Jesus, and there's still a reminder of the fact that at one time, my life was not right with God. So, with this idea of removing the stain, using a stone that has been covered over, now you have the idea of God not only covering over the engraving with the blood of Jesus, but He now – because of His unsurpassed love – rubs the face of the stone absolutely smooth so that there's no longer any engraving covered over by blood, as if there had never been anything engraved there to begin with! That is incredible and that is the kind of forgiveness that God makes available to everyone who is obedient to Him!

Scholarships

Thirty scholarships will be awarded in 2018, with two recipients designated as Urban Agriculture Scholars.

Recipients are selected based on a combination of academic achievement, participation and leadership in school and community organizations and the applicant's commitment to an agricultural career.

Applicants must be high school seniors enrolling in a college or university during the 2018 fall semester

to pursue an agriculture-related academic major and career.

Applicants must reside in, or immediate family must farm in, one of 60 central and southern counties in Illinois served by FCI.

Recipients will receive \$1,000 for the fall 2018 semester and \$1,000 for fall 2020.

Grant Program

Farm Credit Illinois also invites 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters organizing projects to apply for a \$400 Community Improvement Grant.

Fifty \$400 grants will be awarded to assist youth members in bringing positive change to their local community.

FCI advised that clubs should choose a project that delivers tangible value where the outcome is visible.

Farm Credit encourages collaboration with other local organizations to develop and complete the improvement project.

Illinois tax filing season scheduled to start on Jan. 29

The Illinois Department of Revenue, IDOR, plans to begin accepting 2017 state individual income tax returns on Monday, Jan. 29.

Jan. 29 is the same date that the Internal Revenue Service, IRS, plans to begin accepting federal individual income tax returns.

IDOR is reminding taxpayers that filing tax returns electronically and requesting direct deposit into a checking or savings account is still the fastest, most secure way to receive a refund.

IDOR begins this tax season with a continued focus on protecting taxpayers and state government against fraud.

"The State of Illinois' continued resolve to detect and prevent tax return fraud has resulted in an overall savings of more than \$31 million in calendar year 2017: a 52 percent increase from 2016," IDOR director Connie Beard said in a news release.

"We are protecting our taxpayers, ensuring refunds go to the correct individual, and saving money."

As fraud prevention measures continue, IDOR anticipates direct deposit refunds will be issued four weeks from the time an

error-free electronically filed return was submitted.

MyTax Illinois, IDOR's free online account management program, is scheduled to begin accepting individual income tax returns on Jan. 29.

Taxpayers can file their Form IL-1040 for free using MyTax Illinois.

Individuals also may utilize MyTax Illinois to make payments, check the status of their Illinois individual income tax refund using Where's My Refund?

Individuals also can look up their IL-PIN, estimated tax payments and 1099-G amounts.

In calendar year 2017, over 6 million individual income tax returns were filed with IDOR. Of those, 84 percent were filed electronically.

Over 4 million, or 66 percent, of those who filed an individual income tax return received a refund.

The tax rate increased in July 2017 to 4.95 percent from 3.75 percent. Most filers will use a blended rate of 4.3549 percent.

Illinois Schoolyard Habitat Action Grant funds awarded

The Illinois Department of Natural Resources, IDNR, and the Illinois Conservation Foundation, ICF, recently announced that 21 Illinois Schoolyard Habitat Action Grants have been awarded from the fall 2017 application period. A total of \$18,303.58 will be distributed.

The Illinois Schoolyard Habitat Action Grant program supports the development or enhancement of wildlife habitat on the school grounds or other public places.

Funding for the program is provided through donations to the ICF.

The Jadel Youth Fund and the Daniel F. and Ada L. Rice Foundation are the major sponsors for the program.

More than \$255,000 in Illinois Schoolyard Habitat Action Grant funding has been distributed since the program's inception. Projects in 84 Illinois counties have been supported.

Applications will be accepted soon for the Nov. 30, 2018, Illinois Schoolyard Habitat Action Grant application deadline.

Anna man sentenced

Union County State's Attorney Tyler R. Edmonds reported on Jan. 16 that Stewart Everett Gowan, 68, of Anna was sentenced to four years in the Illinois Department of Corrections on one count of aggravated criminal sexual abuse, which is a Class 2 felony.

Gowan also will serve a two-year period of mandatory supervised release and must register as a sex offender for life.

Gowan committed an act of sexual conduct with a 14-year-old minor in October 2017.

Gowan was arrested in October 2017 as part of an investigation by the Anna Police Department.

Governor's executive order ends legislators representing clients before tax appeal board

An executive order was issued Jan. 19 by Gov. Bruce Rauner which declared it impermissible for state legislators to represent clients before the Illinois Property Tax Appeal Board, which hears appeals of assessment decisions made in the state's 102 counties.

Calling the practice a "clear conflict of interest that must end," Rauner said the order, which is effective immediately, is a key step toward restoring public trust and motivating lawmakers to tackle meaningful property-tax reform.

"We have a deeply flawed and overly complicated property-tax system that recent investigations have shown results in inequitable, disproportionately high property-tax burdens on low-income residents, not to mention our property taxes overall are simply too high," Rauner said in a news release.

"For any legislator to profit from this system undercuts the public's faith that they are in office to do what's best for their constituents.

"Legislators who make money representing clients who are appealing their property-tax assessments have little incentive to do what's right when it comes to property-tax reform," Rauner said.

"Frankly, they have everything to gain from the status quo. The action I'm taking today marks the beginning of the end of a dubious era."

The executive order signed by the governor:

- Directs members of the Illinois Property Tax Appeal Board to prohibit state legislators from participating in appeals coming before them.

- Directs the board to prohibit legislators from receiving any fee or compensation, directly or indirectly, through any interest in a partnership, limited liability corporation or other business entity representing clients before it.

- Notes a State of Il-

inois Code of Personal Conduct requirement that government be conducted in a transparent, ethical, accountable and motivated manner.

- Points out that state officials and employees "may not engage in outside employment or activities, including seeking or negotiating for employment, that conflict with their

official state duties and responsibilities," according to the conduct code.

- Directs the board to amend its rules and procedures to reflect the executive order.

The Illinois Property Tax Appeal Board hears about 30,000 appeals a year, approximately three-fourths of them from Cook County.

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Illinois LLC fees rolled back

Legislation was signed in December which substantially reduces start up, annual filing and other fees for limited liability companies, LLCs, the organizational structure preferred by many of Illinois' 1.2 million small businesses.

The new law, which was signed by Gov. Bruce Rauner, is designed to encourage more businesses to form in Illinois rather than go to other states to escape high fees.

Effective as of Dec. 20, the filing fee for new LLCs drops to \$150 from \$500 and annual report fees drop to \$75 from \$250.

Previously, Illinois charged fees that were among the highest in the nation.

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Circus memorabilia donated to university

A dedicated circus fan has donated more than 250,000 items to the Circus and Allied Arts Collection at Milner Library at Illinois State University in Normal.

Herbert Ueckert of Sarasota, Fla., who has been collecting for decades, donated a vast collection that contains everything from artists' original sketches of professional circus posters, and candid and publicity photographs, to clown props and performer's costumes.

"I'm not sure I've ever seen so many spangles and feathers in my life. It's fantastic," said Maureen Brunsdale, the head of special collections and rare books at the library.

"The passion of Herb and his partner Neil Cockerline is the circus, its history, and its impact on society. Circuses helped to entertain and inspire. With the col-

lection we will continue to inspire for generations to come."

Ueckert knew of Milner's circus collection, one of the largest special collections of its type in existence.

"We never make a gift without first researching all of the institutions that we are considering, which we did with our circus collection," said Ueckert, who explored the facilities, resources, and met with the special collections staff.

"After our research and planning, our choice was easy and that's why we asked Milner Library to consider our collection for a gift."

After spending his career working in the school libraries of Las Vegas, Ueckert said he was drawn to Illinois State's collection because it also serves as a resource for classes.

"We are absolutely

thrilled that they have accepted our collection and look forward to seeing the items shared and used for educating ISU students and the larger public," he said.

"The possibilities are endless," Brunsdale noted. "Students in family and consumer sciences can explore the construction techniques of historic costumes, the school of theatre students can study the performer contracts and publicity stills, school of art students can examine original poster art."

While working to make items available to students and classes, Brunsdale and the special collections staff will work to design exhibits around the new items.

"We have a jeweled elephant blanket," she said in awe. "It is enormous, as you can imagine, and gorgeous. People need to see it."

Tad Lincoln personal item donated to library

The Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum in Springfield has been given a unique personal item that once belonged to Lincoln's youngest son: a ring braided from the hair of Tad Lincoln's pony.

An Effingham family has owned the tiny ring, which has a small clasp engraved with "Thomas Lincoln," since an ancestor received it while living in Washington in the 1860s.

"This is an amazing and personal piece," said Dr. James Cornelius, curator of the presidential library's Lincoln Collection.

"We've never before seen a keepsake related to one of the Lincolns' pets. It's a wonderful reminder of Tad as a little boy playing with his menagerie of animals on the White House grounds."

Thomas "Tad" Lincoln often rode his pony in a space adjoining the White House and the Treasury Building, where a Union officer named Thomas C. Kelly was stationed.

Kelly was married to a young woman named Catherine, who became friendly with Tad.

At some point, Tad gave the small woven band to Catherine, perhaps as a farewell when he and his mother left Washington after Abraham Lincoln's assassination. Mary Lincoln gave many mementoes to friends over the years.

Thomas Kelly died a few years later. His wife remarried and moved to Effingham, where her descendants, the Broom family, had held onto the ring...until now. Carbondale attorney William Broom III donated it to the Lincoln Presidential Library.

"Mr. Broom and his family deserve tremendous thanks from the people of Illinois and the entire country," said Alan Lowe, executive director of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum.

"Their generous donation means this one-of-a-kind artifact will be preserved and enjoyed by the public as part of the presidential library's collections."

Hair jewelry was common during the Victorian era. Often it was made from human hair as a reminder of a loved one, perhaps someone who had died.

History of Illinois featured in new book

A new, full-length book about the history of Illinois celebrates the state's bicentennial while covering the fascinating people, places, and events of the last 250 years in the state.

More printings have been ordered for "The History of Illinois," a fully-documented, illustrated soft cover work of 220 pages by historian and author Tom Emery of Carlinville.

Emery is a contributor to multiple Illinois newspapers who has lectured about his research to audiences statewide.

The author said that demand for "The History of Illinois" exceeded expectations, leading to the need for additional printings.

Released in December, 2017, Emery said in a news release that the book has been warmly received by readers, who laud its eye-catching cover and easy-to-read content.

"The History of Illinois" is intended to complement the state's 200th anniversary in 2018, Emery said. Illinois achieved statehood in 1818.

The book includes all 70 of Emery's columns, along with four of his other articles relating to the history of the state.

"The History of Illinois" includes over 40 photos as well as a 10-page

bibliography, complete footnotes with annotation and an index.

Despite Illinois' countless figures and events of interest, surprisingly little has been written in recent years on the general history of Illinois, the author noted.

Emery said his book was written to fill that need with a comprehensive look at the stories that have defined the state, including the pre-statehood era, railroad, agriculture, inventions, Lincoln and the Civil War, gender and racial advancements, the Haymarket Affair, the Chicago Fire and World's Fair and the wars of the 20th century.

Emery said that readers can learn a lot from the book in just a little time.

"This isn't something that takes a long time to read, or learn from," he said. "A reader can pick up the book, turn to any page, spend a few minutes, and take something away from it."

"The History of Illinois" appeals to readers of all ages and levels of interest in history, including students.

"I wanted this book to be easy for everyone to read," said Emery. "The history of the state belongs to everyone, and I wanted to reach a general audience, with people of all ages and interests."

Sept. 13: "When Character was King: A Story of Ronald Reagan." Moderator: ALPLM executive director Alan Lowe.

Nov. 8: "South Side Girls: Growing Up in the Great Migration." Moderator: Historian Holly Kent, University of Illinois Springfield.

"The Illinois History Forum was a big success in 2017, both in the number of people participating and the fascinating topics they discussed. We're expecting even bigger things in 2018, when the state's 200th birthday will bring new attention to Illinois history," said Alan Lowe, executive director of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum.

a harvest of 3,308 in the 2016 muzzleloader season. Late-Winter Seasons: The 2017-18 late-winter antlerless-only and special CWD deer seasons concluded on Jan. 14, with a combined preliminary harvest total for both seasons of 3,505 deer, compared with a harvest of 4,696 deer taken during those seasons in 2016-2017.

There were 15 Northern Illinois counties open to the special CWD season in 2017-2018, while 14 counties were open for the 2016-17 seasons. The special CWD season is used to assist in slowing the spread of chronic wasting disease in the Illinois deer herd.

late-winter season in 2016-2017. Counties that are at or below their individual deer population goal for two consecutive years may be removed from the late-winter season. Tables with a county-by-county summary of preliminary deer harvest results for 2017-2018 and harvest results for 2016-2017 can be seen online at https://www.dnr.illinois.gov/news/Documents/IDNR-DeerPrelimHarvestJan2018.pdf.

During the 2017-2018 deer seasons, hunters took 44 percent does and 56 percent males. Preliminary 2017-2018 harvest totals for Union County reported by IDNR include: archery, 795; youth, 31; firearm, 1,530; muzzleloader, 64; total, 2,420. The county total for 2016-2017 was 2,447.

Williamson County: archery, 1,166; youth, 36; firearm, 1,775; muzzleloader, 47; total, 3,024. The total for 2016-2017 was 2,773. IDNR shared statewide preliminary harvest totals for archery, youth, traditional firearm, muzzleloader and late-winter hunting seasons.

That compares with the harvest of 53,468 during the 2016-2017 archery season. Youth: Youth deer hunters harvested a preliminary total of 2,372 deer during the three-day Illinois youth deer season, which was Oct. 7-9, 2017, compared

WHEN JOHNSON COUNTY SPANNED RIVER TO RIVER

Stories of the Pioneers

Hezekiah West,

a pioneer from South Carolina, brought his family and several other related families to the Illinois Territory in 1811. Settling in that area of present-day southwestern Johnson County that bears his name, he helped to develop and civilize the country around him.

While a young man, his father who originated in Maryland, was killed at Fort McIntosh on the Satilla River in Georgia while serving in the Revolutionary War. Young Hezekiah took up the cause at the age of sixteen years and served for a time with a group of Mounted Rangers. After the war, in a country that was also occupied by Tories, or those that opposed fighting the British, Hezekiah and his mother suffered indignities perpetrated by those men.

Having married and begun a family, West, along with several other relatives, moved into Tennessee, then Kentucky before making their final move to the Illinois Territory. They all settled in what is now known as the West Eden community, named after Hezekiah.

Being a very religious man, he held services in his front yard until the community could build a building for worship. The West Eden Methodist Church also bears the West name.

Being an educated man, he also maintained a school where he was the teacher. He also served his community, being the first Treasurer of Johnson

County. He served as a Justice of the Peace and was appointed to serve as a Judge of the County Court.

The West name can be noted in many old county documents. Beyond that, he also served as one of two men from Johnson County that helped to create the Constitution of Illinois when it became a state in 1818. Serving along with West in the Constitutional Convention was William McFatridge, the subject of our next sketch.

William McFatridge,

also known as "Billy" McFatridge, came to old Johnson County, settling about three miles due west of present day Simpson. The family settled along a creek that would later be named after them - Mac's Creek, later evolving to be known as Max Creek.

Not much has been written about William McFatridge but he was later elected to serve in the General Assembly of Illinois from Johnson County. In the book, *Sketch of Edward Coles*, he being the second Governor of Illinois, the following footnote concerning William McFatridge is found.

"Mr. McFatridge was, I judge, of Scotch-Irish origin; a man about sixty years of age, of kind heart and generous disposition. He had fallen into the very general evil of the time, and drank more liquor than his legislative duties actually required. Late in an afternoon session a member moved an adjournment; Mr. McFatridge, in his chair, opposed it. It was carried

by a large vote, and the speaker declared the House adjourned. McFatridge, raising his voice above the noise occasioned by the general movement, exclaimed: "Mr. Speaker, Mr. Speaker; you may adjourn the House, and be hanged, but old Billy McFatridge will remain in session until sundown, and look after the interests of his constituents, while you are cavorting at Copp's grocery and getting drunk on the hard earnings of the people."

The names of these two men, McFatridge and West, are bound to be forgotten by those who should remember them.

The name of the creek that was named in memory of William McFatridge, has deteriorated on modern maps to that of "Max Creek." There should be a movement that will restore the name to "Mac's Creek," in honor of William McFatridge.

Hezekiah West has been served no less an indignity by the corruption of the signs that point to the West Eden Road, going through the community that was named for Mr. West.

The road signs have changed the name of the road to "W. Eden Road," like it is a direction. The name "West" should be emphasized to restore the glory this old pioneer deserves. The road signs should say, "West Eden Road," in honor of Mr. West rather than reducing his memory to a direction.

State treasurer: two new ways to claim unclaimed property

The claiming of unclaimed property has become easier and faster as the result of a new process announced by Illinois State Treasurer Michael Frerichs.

There are two new ways to claim unclaimed property.

E-Claiming allows the public to upload necessary claim information in an electronic format on the treasurer's office's website, which is safe and secure.

Once the documentation is uploaded in real-time, it is transferred to a database, saving the public weeks of processing time.

Fast Track allows quick approval and payment for simple, lower dollar amount claims.

The automated review process compares the information submitted by the claimant to the information reported on the property, which could include Social Security numbers, past and current addresses, and past and current names.

Claims that involve es-

tates, heirs and/or deceased relatives often are more complex and likely would not be eligible for eClaim or Fast Track.

"We have more than 2.9 billion in unclaimed property to return to Illinois residents, and we hope the new changes to the claims process will encourage more people to visit www.illinoistreasurer.gov/ICASH to claim what's theirs," Frerichs said in a news release.

The Illinois treasurer's office is the custodian of unclaimed property including lost bank accounts, insurance policy proceeds, and forgotten safe deposit boxes.

Items are surrendered after private entities tried for at least five years to locate the owners.

Because thousands of items are surrendered each year, residents are advised to check I-Cash every six months.

The treasurer's office never charges to search for, or return, unclaimed property.

Endowment supported

Farm Credit Illinois, FCI, recently contributed an additional \$400,000 into a farmdoc endowment at the University of Illinois Foundation, originally established in December 2010.

Farmdoc and farmdoc-daily provide farm families with online tools, information, and resources to help farmers make business decisions on their farm.

Since FCI established the farmdoc endowment with a \$350,000 gift in 2010, the endowment has provided more than \$100,000 of program support while its market value has gradually grown to \$400,000.

Math teaching conference planned

His presentation will explore a mathematics quality lesson study using the concepts of collaborative lesson research and teaching math through problem solving. The conference also will feature a variety of breakout sessions.

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A New Geography of Illinois Union County

A New Geography of Illinois, Union County, was featured in the June/July 1974 issue of Outdoor Illinois magazine.

The article was written by Robert H. Mohlenbrock of Southern Illinois University. Layout and photography were by John Richardson. Illustrations were by Fredda J. Burton.

Union County's history, people, communities and geography were featured in the article. In conjunction with Union County's bicentennial during 2018, highlights from the 1974 article are being shared.

THE FIRST PERMANENT SETTLERS to come into what is now Union County were making their way to Kaskaskia, where most of the white man's activities in the Illinois Territory centered at the turn of the nineteenth century.

It was in 1803 that George Wolf, a Dunkard minister, and Abram Hunsaker, and their families, came from Ft. Massac across Union County by way of the Cache River.

Legend has it that these early adventurers camped one night south of the present community of Jonesboro and, finding the hunting excellent, decided to establish their permanent home.

Of course, Indians were in the region at that time, but there are no reports in the histories that indicated any problems for the Wolfs and Hunsakers.

The next entry into Union County by white settlers was near the Mississippi River just west of Ware when David Green and his family homesteaded in 1805.

It can be seen, therefore, that permanent white settlers came to Union County a short time after coming to Jackson County.

By 1809, the Lawrences and the Clapps had settled near Mill Creek. It was during this year that the venerable John Grammer, who three years later was to represent the area in the first territorial legislature and then to serve in the state senate, took up residence south of Jonesboro.

After the War of 1812, settlers began coming into the area at a steady pace.

The region was known as an excellent hunting grounds, and the nearness of the Ohio and Mississippi Rivers offered additional advantages to the area.

By 1818, eighteen hundred persons resided in the county. By then, the first white child, J.D. Lamer, had been born in the county in 1815.

The site for Jonesboro, the first town in the county, had been selected in 1816. By 1817, the first school had been established, and the first water grist mill was in operation.

Until 1818, the present area of Union County was included in Johnson County, as were Alexander and Pulaski counties.

On January 2, 1818, Union County was created out of Johnson County and, for over a year, the newly formed county included all of Alexander County and part of Pulaski.

The original charter for

Union County provided that the court for the county be held in the house of George Hunsaker, Jr., until a permanent court house could be erected.

The first court house, constructed of logs later in 1818 at a cost of \$55, consisted of a 20-foot square judge's room and a 15-foot square jury room.

The selection of Union for the name of the new county dates back to 1816 when a combined religious service of Dunkards and Baptists took place in the southeastern corner of the county. The Union County seal depicts the two ministers in a spirit of Union.

An event which was to influence the prosperity of the county occurred in 1820 when Widow Nancy Willard and her four young children came to Jonesboro. Elijah, the eldest son, clerked for a while but quickly became the owner of the business which for years was known across southern Illinois as Willard and Company. This company was most active in hauling goods and farm products of the local residents to the Mississippi River where they were loaded on riverboats for transport to New Orleans and other ports.

Conversely, supplies needed by these early Illinoisans came by boat from these same ports and were picked up and distributed by Willard and Company.

In only a few short years, the company had sales of over \$100,000 per year.

To facilitate the business with the riverboats, the Willards constructed a superb gravel road (the best in the area) from Jonesboro to Willard's Landing on the Mississippi.

The Willards were also responsible for the first steam saw mill and first steam grist mill in the area in 1836.

School Dental Clinic Program Completed

The last dental clinic, held at A-J High School.

Approximately seventeen percent of the public school children of Union County have perfect teeth. With the last dental examination, held at the Anna-Jonesboro Community school Oct. 10, a total of 5377 pupils had been examined. Of these, 569 received bitumens for perfect teeth.

Every pupil in the public schools of the county has now been given the opportunity for a free dental examination, as a part of the intensive health program conducted by Superintendent of Schools Russell D. Rendleman and the county nurse, Miss Lillian Archer.

The dental records show that the children of Anna-Jonesboro and neighboring school districts have better teeth than those of any of the six other divisions of the county. Twenty-five per cent of the pupils examined in this division were awarded bitumens for perfect teeth. The Alto Pass division was next with twenty per cent.

A chart has been posted in each school room of the county with the name of every pupil in the room. As the children have their dental corrections made, certified by a signed statement from the dentist, they are marked perfect on the chart, and given their bitumens. An effort is being made for taking care of the dental work of indigent children. Such a plan, proposed by the doctors of the county, is already being carried out for indigent children with physical defects.

Wildcats Beat Pinckneyville By 12-6 Score

Delegation From St. Louis To Be Here In Nov. Arrive Tuesday

\$500 In Cash Awards For Vocational Agriculture Students

Vocational agriculture students from nineteen high schools of southern Illinois will enter the poultry and grain contests here, Nov. 16, 14, and 17, competing for \$500 in cash awards.

Every year, each of twenty sections of the state is allotted \$1000 from the State Fair fund, to be used for prizes in vocational agriculture. The nineteen Southern Illinois schools with departments of this kind, comprising section 20, hold two exhibitions each year.

The first this year, the livestock and vegetable contests at Anna, have already been held, with awards totaling \$1000.

Anna has never been the scene of one of these shows before, and it is made possible this time by the Anna Chamber of Commerce, which is meeting the expenses except for the actual prize money. The committee on Agriculture, with E. P. Owen chairman, will work with O. K. Leemis, teacher of vocational agriculture, in completing the plans.

The poultry exhibits, and possibly the grain exhibits, will be shown in the Anna Products building. The public will be welcomed, with no admission charge.

The \$500 will be used only for prizes on the exhibits of poultry and grain. Ribbons will be awarded, however, in grain-judging contests. Points in these contests will apply with those of the fatstock, dairy, and poultry and egg judging in the spring, toward the winning of the sectional banner, Anna-Jonesboro won this banner last year.

Nineteen boys from Anna-Jonesboro High are planning to enter poultry in the show. A New Geography of Illinois

Union County

(continued from page 2)

The notable forced trek of the Cherokee, Creek, and Chickasaw Indians from their homes in the southeastern United States to Oklahoma Territory came across Union County.

Two markers, one along Route 146 east of Anna and one along Route 146 west of Jonesboro, tell of two nearby campsites for the Indians during the winter of 1838-39.

A portion of an interview in 1932 by Mary Hill Wiley with 91-year-old Mary Ann Willard Goodman gives wonderful insight into early life in Union County and particularly into the Indian

movement across Union County:

"I as the daughter of Willis and Francis Webb Willard, was born in a one-room log house two miles west of what is now Jonesboro, Union County, Illinois, June 23, 1841.

"I can still see the old log house on the hill, the spring just beneath the hill under a mossy bank, a deep pool running down to the log milk house.

"In 1842 we moved into a larger house father had built on the same 40-acre tract and remember we had the first coal stove in the community, it being shipped from Pittsburg and landed in a steamboat at Willard's Landing, which

my father owned and operated.

"We still cooked many things, however, on the irons in the fireplace of which our house had six, one each in the kitchen, dining room, parlor and bedrooms upstairs.

"Just six years before I was born, or in 1835, (it actually was during the winter of 1838-39) the United States government moved the Creek, Cherokee and Chickasaw tribes of Indians from their Georgia and Florida reservations to their new homes in the Oklahoma Territory.

"This was in the midst of a severe winter, and they travelled on foot and by ferries across large streams, the old route through the Ozarks from the Ohio River to the Mississippi River at Willard's Landing was the only open route.

"After they had crossed the Ohio the intense cold had frozen the Mississippi solid and it was necessary for the army officers to quarter their charges until the river broke up.

"Three thousand of them were quartered six miles east of Jonesboro...160 acres which the Indians cleared of timber for firewood that winter.

"There now is a large church and fine cemetery known as Camp Ground Church, taking its name from this Indian camp almost one hundred years ago.

"Three thousand five hundred were quartered three miles west of Jonesboro on Dutch Creek... which was on the old Willard Landing turnpike road.

"This was near our home, and father had told me how the army officers employed

him to run his grist mill day and night, grinding meal for the Indians and each morning would call and give him a government order for \$100.00.

"Two of the most prominent chiefs' names were 'Bushyhead' and 'Nowatta.' They boarded in Jonesboro with Mr. Winstead Davie and made daily trips back and forth to the camp on Dutch Creek. When the river opened they crossed into Missouri at Willards Landing."

Long before the tragic trek of these nineteenth century Indians, the area of Union County was inhabited by prehistoric Indians.

Large quantities of broken pottery, flint tools, broken projectile points, and flint chips, particularly in the Mill Creek and Reynoldsville-Ware areas, point

to considerable activity by these early Indians.

Settlers in the Mill Creek area reported that the ground was so full of flint chips and fragments that they could barely get their plow through it.

Mill Creek flint is thought to have come from at least forty different quarries in the area. A spade and two hoes, made from Mill Creek flint, can be seen exhibited at the Cobden Museum.

Jonesboro remained the only town in the county until 1841 when a small settlement developed around a mineral spring in the northeastern section of the county.

Known as Saratoga, the town tried to capitalize on the high mineral content of the water, but such was not to be the case and the town never thrived.

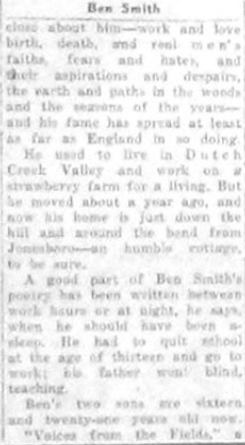

These hours can be spent learning about a financial topic, making phone calls to compare insurance policies, or checking your credit report for accuracy – the list goes on. Let's talk about investing your money wisely.

Once you have money set aside in savings to cover unexpected expenses, consider investing. Investing money is best for long-term goals; those goals that are 10 years or further away.

When you are planning for long-term goals, one of the most significant risks that you need to manage is the cost of inflation. The current inflation rate for the United States is 2.2 percent for the last 12 months, according to the U.S. Labor Department. While this is a relatively low inflation rate historically, it still has a significant impact on savings.

For example, if you have saved \$2,000 today and receive no return on the money, in 20 years this would only buy approximately \$1,300 of goods, assuming a constant inflation rate in the future.

The main take-away message here is that your savings for the long-term must earn a return rate (in interest, dividends or increased value) greater than inflation in order for your investments to truly make money for you. This return can be over time, not necessarily each year.

Given that it's difficult to find a savings account paying even 1 percent interest currently, we need to look beyond savings and money market accounts to find a way for our investments to grow.

Savings tools, like savings accounts and certificate of deposits, are good financial tools for our emergency savings and for intermediate-term goals that will occur in two to 10 years. While the return (in interest payments) is low, the money is very safe and we can access it when needed easily.

To earn a higher rate of return, we need to use investment options that have a higher risk, meaning the investment value may go down or up over time and we may lose the dollars we invest.

However, by considering historical data, and by using common investment strategies such as diversifying our dollars and planning for the long-term, our investments can grow 5 percent to 10 percent on average over many years.

To read more about how to diversify your dollars, I highly suggest my colleague, Karen Chan's, recent blog post, "Investing 101: Mutual funds can make investing simple," at <http://go.illinois.edu/diversify>.

Planning for the long-term is important. While different investing philosophies exist, many experts believe that investing for the long-term is a very important principle; this means leaving your money in investments and not paying high costs to jump in and out of investments. Too often people buy investments when they're popular and costs are high (for example, purchasing Bitcoins as the prices soared recently) and then selling as the price dropped.

When investing, keep these words in mind: If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. The higher the potential gain, the higher the risk.

If you choose to invest in speculative investment choices, like Bitcoins, be sure you only invest what you can afford to lose. I recommend reading "Don't Fall for Cryptocurrency-Related Stock Scams," at <http://www.finra.org/investors/the-alert-investor>.

Other investment options such as many mutual funds and employer-sponsored retirement plans offer lower potential gains, but significantly lower risk. In the long-term, these diversified investment choices will likely provide a return higher than inflation with only a moderate risk.

Before making investment choices, do your research. Read about investing strategies, talk to investment professionals, and plan for the long-term. You can learn more about choosing a financial professional to work with at <https://web.extension.illinois.edu/financialpro/>. Make 2018 the year you invest in your finances.

The newly created Junior College Board met in special session Wednesday, Jan. 17, with Gerald Smith, executive secretary of the State Board for Junior Colleges. At this meeting, the title Shawnee Junior College District was officially approved and henceforth the college will bear this name.

The second Saturday in April, April 13, is the date set for school board elections in Union County.

Eugene Powell, administrator, announces that the Union County Hospital has received a year's accreditation by the Board of Commissioners of the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals in the state of Illinois.

The Board of Commissioners of the Joint Commission on Accreditation has granted Anna State Hospital accreditation "for a period of three years or until a subsequent survey is conducted."

A special commemorative committee, headed by George E. Fager, met in the social room of Mt. Moriah Lutheran Church last week to finalize plans for the dedication and re-dedication of the remodeling of the original church building. The dedication service will be held Sunday, Feb. 11, 1968, at the regular morning service at 10:30 a.m. followed by a tea and reception to be held in the Social Room from 2 to 5 o'clock in the afternoon.

For a few days this past week, it seemed almost as though spring was on its way to the Union County area when temperatures rose to 59 and the lows were in the high thirties. The snow which had remained on the ground since New Year's Day melted and spirits rose as sunny skies prevailed.
