Opioid manufacturers named in lawsuit

Union County State's in Union County Circuit linois Consumer Fraud and classes and includes your ers through a coordinated Attorney Tyler R. Edmonds on June 26 filed a lawsuit opioid manufacturers and their related companies.

Edmonds said in a news release that the lawsuit is brought on behalf of the People of the State of Illinois, the People of Union County and Union County government. The lawsuit was filed Monday afternoon

Court in Jonesboro.

The lawsuit alleges that against five prescription the pharmaceutical companies made numerous misrepresentations about the risk, benefits and adverse effects of opioids for the purpose of increasing prof-

The suit claims that the pharmaceutical companies' misrepresentations were in violation of both the Il-

Deceptive Practices Act and the Uniform Deceptive Trade Practices Act. Edmonds explained in the news release why he filed the lawsuit.

"Throughout the country there is an opioid addiction crisis. Illinois and Union County are no different," he stated.

"This addiction crisis crosses all socioeconomic

neighbors, friends, family members and coworkers.

"All too often this opioid addiction leads to illicit drug use, crime, overdose and death.

"We believe that the evidence will show that this crisis was brought about by opioid manufacturers' drive for profits at the expense of people.

Opioid manufactur-

sophisticated and deceptive marketing campaign have led prescribers and consumers to believe that opioids were not addictive, addiction was easy to overcome, and prolonged use of opioids was appropriate for even low-level pain.

Uncertainty surrounding the event surfaced at last week's regular meeting of the Anna City Council. The council met Tuesday evening, June 20, at Anna City Hall.

At the time of the city council meeting, it appeared that an annual fireworks display at the park would not happen.

The mayor and the city council voiced their appreciation to everyone who "has faithfully come out and supported this event in the years past."



State record pin oak tree dies

A state record pin oak tree which had been growing for many years along Lincoln Street in Anna has been cut down.

The tree died. Last year, only one limb on the nearly 100-foot-tall tree appeared to still be alive. The tree was reported to have been falling apart and was a concern to the people in the area.

The age of the pin oak was uncertain.

The City of Anna had the tree cut down. The tree

98-foot spread. The website noted that the Illinois Big Tree Register "was established in 1962 as a citizen outreach program in order to discover, record, recognize, and appreciate the largest native tree species here in the Prairie State."

Union County treasurer releases annual report

Darren Bailey on June 21 released the annual "Where Do My Taxes Go?" report.

Bailey said the report provides a visual tool for Union County taxpayers to better understand the composition of their tax bills, and how bills from one part of the county compare

The release of the report coincides with last week's mailing of nearly 11,000 Union County property tax

Bailey noted that the graphics in the report were first developed for the 2010 tax year, payable in 2011.

Anna project updates shared

Project updates were shared at last week's regular meeting of the Anna City Council.

The meeting was Tuesday evening, June 20, at

Anna City Hall in Anna. The updates were pre-

sented by city administrator Steve Hartline.

Work continues on several major improvements at the Anna City Park.

Tennis and basketball courts at the park have been resurfaced and repainted. New colors also have been applied. A new, lighted parking area has been carted.

Work also is moving forward on construction of a new concessions/restroom building next to the grandstand at the park. Plans call for the project to be completed by Aug. 1.

The city administrator reported that the third phase of improvements in the South Main Street downtown area have been completed.

The next phase of the improvement work is planned in the North Main Street

Union County Treasurer important to give them a tool to understand why they pay so much, where it goes, and how each taxpayer's bill might compare to another," Bailey said in a news release.

Each unique taxing district is represented by a wedge of a pie graph which is part of the report. The report also includes a bar "Each pie graph repre-

sents a community in Union County. Each piece of the pie is one of the taxing districts to which citizens in that community pay taxes. The larger the wedge, the more you pay to that district," he explained.

The largest wedges in each community represent local school districts. This is consistent from year to

"K-12 schools generally comprise 55 to 67 percent of a tax bill," Bailey added.

Nearly every tax bill in the county shares three taxing districts: Shawnee Community College (9 to 13 percent of a total bill), Union County government (17 to 23 percent) and the county unit road district (2 to 3 percent).

The unit road district is a tax-sharing district; the revenue from that tax is collected to make road improvements, and is proportionately split between the Union County government and each respective municipality.

Cities and villages makeup another 3 to 15 percent, and each local library district usually represents another 2 to 3 percent of each tax bill.

"Taxpayers who want to learn how their tax rates compare to other areas in the county will want to pay special attention to the bar graph" Bailey said.

Tax rates appear to be about the same as last year across the county as a whole, with some communities seeing a small increase, and others small

Approximate tax bills for homes with a \$100,000 value range from \$1953 (rural Cobden, down from \$1994 last year) to \$2867 (within the village limits of Dongola, up from \$2750).

"Paying property taxes is one of those unfortunate events that nearly everyone dreads," he said. "We all hope that the

money is being well spent and contributing to better communities. The first step to ensuring that is to know how much we pay, and "The next step is to eval-

uate the effectiveness and efficiency of that spending, and hold the respective decision makers account-

"We feel the pain of the tax payments now, but sometimes we forget about it throughout the rest of

"If we pay attention to the news that comes out each week, each month, and if we pay attention to the services and infrastructure that we each value the most, we'll get a good idea if the taxes we pay in the summer are being used properly in the winter and spring.

"I hope these reports lead to a more active and engaged citizenry."

Three persons sustained fatal injuries in a two-vehicle traffic accident which happened early Wednesday morning, June 21, on Interstate 57 in Union County.

Opioid manufacturers facing investigation

The Illinois attorney overdose deaths in recent general's office is conducting an investigation with attorneys general across the country into several opioid manufacturers.

The focus of the investigation is to determine whether the manufacturers have engaged in unlawful practices in the marketing and sale of opioids, Illinois Attorney General Lisa Madigan said in a news release.

The investigation also will address what role the companies may be playing in creating or prolonging the country's opioid epi-

Nationwide and in Illinois, opioids – prescription and illicit – are the main driver of drug overdose deaths, the attorney general

Opioids were involved in more than 33,000 deaths nationwide in 2015, and opioid overdoses have quadrupled since 1999, according to information from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"I want to know whether drug companies, seeking higher profits, have intentionally, recklessly and unlawfully pushed addictive opioids," Madigan said in a news release.

"We must hold drug companies accountable for their role in the epidemic levels of opioid overdoses and deaths in Illinois and around the country.'

The Illinois Department Illinois was one of 14 states increases in overall drug opioid addictions.

In 2015, there were 559 overdose deaths directly attributed to prescription opioids in Illinois, and 1,339 overdose deaths in which opioids were involved.

In addition, the Chicago metropolitan area ranks first nationwide in emergency department mentions for heroin use.

Cook County ranks first in the nation in the percentage of arrestees testing positive for opiates.

In August 2016, Madigan filed a lawsuit against the pharmaceutical company Insys Therapeutics Inc. for deceptively marketing and selling Subsys.

Madigan said that Subsys is a highly addictive opioid drug, to physicians treating non-cancer patients for off-label uses like back and neck pain in an effort to rake in high profits.

In addition, in September 2016, Madigan and 35 other attorneys general filed an antitrust lawsuit against the

makers of Suboxone. Suboxone is a prescription drug used to treat opioid addiction.

The lawsuit was filed over allegations that the companies engaged in a scheme to block generic competitors, forcing people to pay artificially high prices at a time when the companies reaped more than \$3 billion in profits.



Middle-class households on decline

CHAMPAIGN – A new report from a University of Illinois expert in urban development and local economies found that the share of middle-income households in the State of Illinois has fallen steadily from nearly 60 percent in 1970 to below 50 percent in the current, post-Great Recession period.

The large middle class in Illinois that emerged during the middle of the 20th century has experienced a consistent but multifaceted squeeze since roughly 1980, with middle-class incomes stagnating relative to higher incomes, according to Robert Habans, a postdoctoral research associate in the School of Labor and Employment Relations at the University of Illinois.

The paper takes a deep Illinois in 2015 as rang- less than their male counterdive into exploring the middle class in Illinois, including the relatively wide variation in the way that the middle class is defined, Habans said.

"Analyzing the middle class is not a straightforward exercise, so it's become increasingly difficult to even define what the middle class is," he said.

"And if there's ambiguity in defining the middle class, there will be a disconnect between policy decisions and their impacts on middle-income households."

After adjusting for household size, Habans calculated the lower and upperbounds of a middleincome household income for a family of three in

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ing between \$43,000 and \$130,000 per year.

An analysis of income patterns from more than three decades of data suggests that the declining portion and changing composition of middle-income households are closely tied to increasing inequality and the changing structure of economic opportunity since 1980, according to the paper.

'The national trends are reflected in Illinois in that, over recent decades, incomes in Illinois have become increasingly polarized," Habans said.

"In this respect, the state is certainly not unique, but the slow hollowing out of its middle class has been stark."

In 1980, the manufacturing industry accounted for a large portion of middleincome jobs, "so the loss of manufacturing jobs is certainly part of the story," Habans said.

"As these and other middle-skill jobs have declined, the service industries that have experienced growth tend to support a wider and more polarized range of skill levels and earnings.

As a result, the jobs that the Illinois economy has created tend to fall on either end of the earnings spectrum rather than in the middle," he said.

The demographics of the middle class in Illinois are changing, as well. Even as they've made strides in their numbers, female workers in Illinois continue to earn

parts, Habans said.

"Both the State of Illinois and its middle-income workforce have grown more diverse - and it's certainly a good thing to see evidence of increasing equality in the labor market, even if it's incomplete," he said.

"But one effect of that is, if you look at household incomes, the rise in female earnings has offset the decrease in male earnings."

Another troubling trend is that black and Hispanic households are still underrepresented in the middleand upper-income households in Illinois, according to the report.

"Although the middle class is becoming less white and less oriented around male workers, race and gender continue to shape access to middle-income employment," Habans said

Policies to help the middle class must be a mix of "growing from below" and "stabilizing from within," Habans said.

"It's all about giving people opportunities to jump from low-wage work to something that pays better, because conventional pathways to middle-class income levels have evaporated for many workers,' he said.

Meanwhile, labor market institutions such as unions and the minimum wage have diminished in their potency to support a broad pattern of income distribution, Habans said.

"If you're going to affect the labor market, you can do that by raising the standards of work or by programmatic interventions in the labor market, such as raising the minimum wage," he said.

"And the goals of the interventions should be to build pathways from lowerincome jobs to middleincome occupations. So that could be improving the quality of low-wage jobs, creating more opportunities to move to a higher-income job, or shoring up and protecting jobs in the middle-

Continental Congress approved the Declaration of Independence, setting the 13 colonies on the road to freedom as a sovereign nation.

This most American of holidays will be marked with typical festivities ranging from fireworks, parades and concerts to more casual family gatherings and barbecues across the country.

As the nation celebrates this Independence Day, Americans reflect on how the Founding Fathers enshrined the importance of statistics in the Constitution as a vital tool for measuring our people, places and economy.

In commemoration of Independence Day, the U.S. Census Bureau shares the following "Facts for Fea-

The Signers

The number of signers to the Declaration of Independence. Benjamin Franklin, John

Adams, Thomas Jefferson, Roger Sherman and Robert R. Livingston comprised the Committee of Five that drafted the declaration.

Jefferson, regarded as the strongest and most eloquent writer, wrote most of the document.

It is also worth noting

John Hancock, president of the Second Continental Congress, was the first signer, and a merchant by trade.

In 2015, there were 7.7 million business establishments with paid employees in the United States; 1.1 million, like Hancock, were in the retail trade industry.

Benjamin Franklin, who

represented Pennsylvania, was the oldest of the signers at age 70. Edward Rutledge, of South Carolina, was the youngest at age 26.

Two future presidents signed the Declaration of Independence: John Adams (the second president) and Thomas Jefferson (the third president). Both died on the 50th anniversary of signing the declaration (July 4, 1826). There are 12 counties nationwide named Adams and 26 named Jefferson.

Robert Livingston, who represented New York, was on the Committee of Five that drafted the Declaration of Independence but was recalled by his state before he could sign it.

Charles Carroll, who represented Maryland, was the last surviving signer of the declaration. He died in 1832 at the age of 95.

Roger Sherman, who worked as a land surveyor and lawyer, represented Connecticut.

In 2015, there were an estimated 25,698 surveyors, cartographers and photogrammetrists employed full time, year-round, and 879,090 lawyers employed full time, year-round nationwide.

The Meisenheimer legacy

Horse showing success over the past thirty years

Jim Meisenheimer didn't realize what might come out of his purchase of a couple of riding horses for his son Mike back in the 1960s. The horses were going to be a hobby for Mike. Jim died in the late 1960s.

Mike bought a farm below Jonesboro on Welding Lane in 1976. The farm had two horses. Mike went to an auction in Mississippi and purchased one performance racking horse. The racking horse is an off-breed of the Tennessee walking horse. The racking horses started in the early 1970s.

This was the beginning of a long and very rewarding hobby career. Mike started slow and entered some local racking and gaited horse shows.

The walking and gaited horses originated on the plantations. The plantation owners

loved them. They would ride them all over the plantations in the south. These walking horses got

their start in riding shows right after the Great Depression in the 1930s in middle Tennessee. The shows were relatively small in the beginning and have transitioned into much larger shows now. In a week of shows, it is not uncommon for shows to have 20,000 in attendance per day and as many as 100,000 over a week.

Mike started with racking horses in 1980. In his class of two year-olds, Mike placed ninth among 50 horses entered in his first horse show. Mike's daughter Lindsay got her start in 1989

entered the style pleasure division with his horse named EB's Special Edition and won a world championship and followed up in 1990 and 1991 with two more world championships.

Mike won the world championship again in 1996 with a horse named Pride Goal Miner. This came in the amateur owned and trained division. The owners would have to train the horse themselves to enter

Mike's son Lance started at age 10 in 1995. His start was very good as he won the Missouri state championship

In 1997, Lance won the Reserve World Championship in Decatur, Ala. This was in the racking horses M&M future market youth owned and trained division.

Lance said, "Not a lot of people own and train anymore. My dad helped me to learn how to train. This helped me learn responsibility at an early age. I'm very grateful for his guidance during my early years."

"In high school I started concentrating on the horses more in 1999-2000. In 2002 I won my first two world championships on the same night in Decatur, Ala. My first was with my horse On Call in the youth owned and trained division, the second with my horse Ramblers Money Train in the youth show pleasure division. It was really an exciting night

for me.

"Later in the same month (September), my horse On Call won third place in the youth owned and trained division of the World Grand Championship, this time on my horse Ramblers Money Train, I won the Reserved World Grand Champion-

"From this time in September 2002, I was motivated to keep on going. Winning is a tremendous motivational tool.

"My horse, On Call, had a very good career. I retired him in 2015 at the age of 18. He won two Reserved World Championships in his 15 competitive years.

"Ramblers Money Train at age 16 won the Show Pleasure World Grand Championship in 2010. In the same year I won the World Grand Championship with a mare called Illumination in the amateur owned and trained class. This event was very special because my dad had won the event.

"In 2011 I was elected to be the World Championship judge. I was the second youngest judge. It was a

at a young age to do this important event.

"In 2012 I showed Ramblers Money Train in a different division. The division was the style pleasure where we won the World Grand Championship. The horse was 18 years old, which made this event super special. My dad won this event in 1989 with EB's Special Edition. Ramblers Money Train was retired in 2015 at age 21.

"The next year in 2013, our horse Jet Black won the Reserved World Grand Championship. Jet Black was sold after the World Championship.

"In 2013 we retired Illumination and are now using her as a brood mare. She has two foals. A two yearold filly was sold recently in South Carolina. We will breed Illumination in a few weeks (2016).

"2016 turned out to be quite the year. I changed my philosophy. I used to show six or seven horses and now I'm taking three horses-quality over quantity.

"I obtained a horse named

great honor to be chosen I'm Lucky in the Sky (mare) this past January. I had my eve on her for a long time, probably five or six years. We won four shows with Lucy, her barn name. Her division was specialty action park performance. She won first place at the Magnolia Spring Celebration, the Missouri State Championship and first place in the specialty action park performance World Grand Championship in Decatur, Ala.

"Another horse, Pumped Up Kicks, won two more championships in 2016; one World Grand Championship and the Reserve World Grand Championship in the specialty action amateur owned and trained division. This brought the total to six championships in 2016.

"We are now beginning our third generation of showing horses."





Fire protection for small communities focus of bill

Legislation sponsored by State Rep. Brandon Phelps, D-Harrisburg, which is aimed at providing fire protection to communities not within an established fire protection district recently passed both the Illinois House and Senate.

The legislation has been sent to the governor.

"This piece of legislation is very important, especially for folks living in Southern Illinois," Phelps said in a news release.

"Much of the area that I represent is rural, which means that many Southern Illinoisans do not live in a municipality that provides fire protection services."

Phelps' measure, House Bill 2551, amends the State Fire Marshal Act and the Law Enforcement and Firefighting Medal of Honor Act.



Most cherished symbol of liberty

"When in the Course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation."

Those words from the Declaration of Independence are so familiar – and they should be.

"The Declaration of Independence is at once the nation's most cherished symbol of liberty," the National Archives declares on its website.

Our most cherished symbol of liberty was drafted by Thomas Jefferson in June of 1776. The document was adopted on July 4, 1776.

The National Archives has noted that the "exalted and unforgettable phrases" crafted by Thomas Jefferson "expressed the convictions in the minds and

hearts of the American people."

The political philosophy of the Declaration was not new; its ideals of individual liberty had already been expressed by John Locke and the Continental philosophers.

What Jefferson did was to summarize this philosophy in "self-evident truths" and set forth a list of grievances against the King in order to justify before the world the breaking of ties between the colonies and the mother country.

For many of us, July 4 will be a holiday, a welcomed day off. Perhaps, as we pause to celebrate our nation's birthday, we can heed the advice of the National Archives and take the time to read the Declaration of Independence. At the least, we might consider the opening paragraph of the document, and

its closing words:

"We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.-That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, --That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness.

"We, therefore, the Representatives of the united States of America, in General Congress, Assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the Name, and by Authority of the good People of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these United Colonies are, and of Right ought to be Free and Independent States; that they are Absolved from all Allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain, is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that as Free and Independent States, they have full Power to levy War, conclude Peace, contract Alliances, establish Commerce, and to do all other Acts and Things which Independent States may of right do. And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of divine Providence, we mutually

pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our

sacred Honor."

State officials: leave fireworks displays to those license, trained

The Illinois Department of Natural Resources, IDNR, is reminding organizations and individuals sponsoring fireworks displays in the state to be sure their fireworks vendor has the required state licenses and certificates issued by the IDNR and the Office of the State Fire Marshal, OSFM, prior to their fireworks show.

The Illinois Explosives Act requires that anyone who purchases, possesses, uses, transfers, stores or disposes of explosives, including display fireworks, must have an explosives license and explosives storage certificate issued by the IDNR.

Licensing and storage requirements administered by the IDNR do not apply to consumer fireworks (classified as 1.4 explosives).

Approved consumer fireworks are regulated by the OSFM and are permitted only in villages, counties and municipalities that have passed ordinances allowing such displays.

Consumer fireworks may be purchased and displayed only by adults who have obtained permits from their local jurisdiction.

Hand-held fireworks, including fire crackers, Roman candles and bottle rockets are not approved for sale or use in Illinois.

In addition to requiring comprehensive licensing, training and examination for individuals, the law requires that unattended display fireworks and explosives must be stored in an explosives magazine, storage facility or container that is inspected and certified by IDNR.

container that is inspected and certified by IDNR.

State officials noted that anyone possessing, using, transferring or purchasing display fireworks without a valid IDNR individual explosives license or storage cer-

valid IDNR individual explosives license or storage certificate is violating Illinois law and could incur penalties.

A violation of the Illinois Explosives Act can be a Class

3 felony, with a maximum penalty of five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

In addition, the IDNR can assess administrative fines

for violations involving display fireworks and other ex-

plosives.
