High wind warning in effect Tuesday for region

Stormy weather last ties included in the warning week in the region was followed by a high wind warning which was in effect for parts of the region on Tuesday.

The National Weather Service in Paducah on Monday issued a high wind warning for parts of Southern Illinois, Southeast Missouri and Western Kentucky.

Union County was included in the warning area. Among the other area coun-

were Johnson, Pope, Alexander, Pulaski and Massac in Southern Illinois and Cape Girardeau in Southeast Missouri.

The warning was in effect from 11 a.m. until 6 p.m. Tuesday.

The weather service reported that south wind gusts of up to 60 miles per hour were possible from late in the morning through the early evening hours on Tuesday.

meant that a "hazardous high wind event" was expected or occurring. Sustained wind speeds of at least 40 mph or gusts of 58 mph or higher could lead to property damage.

"Some trees may be uprooted, numerous large tree limbs will likely be knocked down. A few power lines may be knocked down, but damage to power lines is more likely through trees and limbs falling.

The weather service advised that high-profile "vehicles like semi-trucks may have significant difficulty traveling particularly on east-west roadways."

County at medium level for COVID

The Illinois Department of Public Health, IDPH, on Friday, Feb. 10, announced that the CDC was reporting 15 counties in the state are at an elevated level for COVID-19, compared to 5 a week ago.

Of those, one county was at a high community Level for COVID-19, compared to none the week before; and 14 counties were at a medium level.

Union, Alexander, Pulaski, Jackson and Williamson counties were at a medium level. Johnson and Massac counties were at a low level.

IDPH director Dr. Sameer Vohra also announced today that the department is launching a new rapid response unit called the STATeam (Support, Treatment & Access Team).

The team will be deployed on as-needed basis to long-term care facilities if and when there is a sudden surge of COVID-19

The STATeam is designed to strengthen IDPH's county health department partners in their efforts to support long term care facilities.

The support will include testing, vaccinations, contact tracing and treatments.

upgrades. Clark said the work is doing a good job of building infrastructure in the county's courtooms and offices. She voiced appreciation to the county board for its ongoing support of the technology improvements.

Recording Fee Increase

An upcoming Rental Housing Support Program recording fee update was shared by Union County Clerk Lance Meisenheimer.

As a result of the passage of state legislation, the fee is scheduled to double from a current \$10 to \$20 on July 1.

peak wind gusts of 40 to 50 mph, but there were some locations that experienced wind gusts of 55 to 60 mph.

The highest observed gusts were 62 mph at Carbondale and 59 mph at the Ballard County, Ky., Mesonet.

A 45 mph wind gust was recorded at 3 a.m. on Feb. 9 in Jonesboro.

Strong gradient winds developed after midnight and continued into the day on Feb. 9.

Some of the highest gusts were associated with the last line of heavy showers that moved through.

Other locations observed their highest winds after the rain exited during the early to mid morning hours.

The strong winds occurred due to a rapidly deepening low pressure system that moved from near Springfield, Mo., to Chicago.

A tight pressure gradient developed across our region and the strong winds just off the surface were able to mix down.

These winds produced scattered tree damage and caused some power outages as well.

At the peak, several thousands customers were without power across Southern Illinois. Isolated power outages also occurred in neighboring states.

A Shawnee Community Unit School District No. 84 school bus was involved in a traffic accident Monday afternoon, Feb. 13.

The school district posted a news release on its Facebook page which reported that the bus was traveling north on Illinois Route 3 when the accident occurred. The bus was carrying one

student and the driver. The bus was involved in a multi-vehicle accident which occurred at approximately 3:10 p.m. on the Alexander-Union County

Shawnee Community Unit District No. 84 administrators responded to the scene. Various emergency services agencies were already on the scene.

The driver and the student were transported to a local hospital for further evaluation.

The news release posted on social media closed by stating that Shawnee Community Unit District No. 84 "is so thankful for the swift response of all of the first responders and emergency agencies to today's accident."

An update posted on the school district's Facebook page at 6:30 p.m. shared that the bus driver and student had been treated and released from the hospital.

The Union County Sheriff's Office in Jonesboro posted a message on social media Monday afternoon that Illinois Route 3 had been closed due to a traffic

The highway was closed from Illinois Route 146 W at the State Route 3 Ware intersection to the Union-Alexander county line in McClure.

Traffic was being asked to avoid the area and to detour through Olive Branch and State Route 127.

At about 7:30 p.m. Monday, the sheriff's office posted on social media that the road had been cleared and Route 3 was back open to traffic.



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Wellness on Wheels van set to visit Anna

The WOW van travels to high health risk communities in the lower seven counties of Illinois. The counties are served by Southern 7 Health Department.

The WOW van is scheduled to be at the Dollar General Store in Anna from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Feb. 22.

Free services which are available include NAR-CAN training, blood pressure checks, colorectal cancer tests (FIT) and medication disposal packets.

Services which are available for a fee include blood lead, hemoglobin and cholesterol screenings, STD tests (including chlamydia, gonorrhea and syphilis), A benefit corn hole tour-

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As the winter flu season skin tests and well water

All services will be offered while supplies last. No appointment will be necessary for services. Walk-ins are welcome.

Charged services, including COVID-19 vaccines and boosters and flu shots, require a health insurance card.

Southern Seven advised and many other services that those who will be requesting a COVID-19 booster are asked to bring their vaccine card.

The Wellness on Wheels

van is a multidisciplinary unit which is available to the Southern Seven Health Department through a partnership with IDPH to provide health screenings and other services.

IDPH partners with health agencies and hospitals to provide staff and services at the Wellness on Wheels van at sites where people can come for medical services.

Back in those days we never locked our doors not even at night because no one ever came in homes around where we lived unless they were ask.


I opened the book to look at it and was even more surprised to see the author was a friend who I haven't seen in a long time Joanne Blakley.



Rural America changing, not dying

Ben Winchester is hoping to flip the script on the negative narrative surrounding rural communities.

"The narrative we're using to describe our small towns and rural places is terrible," said Winchester, rural sociologist for the Center for Community Vitality at the University of Minnesota. As an example, he points to words like "sleepy" and "dying," which he sees used regularly in mainstream media.

"The implication is no one is doing anything," he said.

Winchester kicked off the University of Illinois Extension's Attracting Rural Residents interactive webinar series, cohosted by Illinois Farm Bureau, Rural Partners, the Illinois Institute for Rural Affairs, the Association of Illinois Rural and Small Schools and the Governor's Rural Affairs Council.

During the first webinar on Jan. 17, Winchester walked those who attended through misconceptions about rural America and how to change the conversation. The three different webinars, the second was Jan. 31 and the third is scheduled for Feb. 14, are geared toward community leaders seeking design strategies to recruit rural residents.
