Weather outlook... From snow, sleet, ice, to heavy rain, strong winds

Last week, the Union County area experienced a mixture of sleet, snow and ice pellets.

This week, heavy rain and strong storms were possible in the region.

Icy Conditions: The National Weather Service office in Paducah reported that a mixture of sleet and freezing rain impacted the region during the late afternoon and evening on Jan. 30.

An initial round of wintry weather moved out overnight. A secondary wave moved in during the afternoon and evening on Jan. 31.

Temperatures were well below freezing, so roads quickly became covered with sleet, which compacted down to an icy coating.

Even in the days that followed, many secondary roads were ice-covered, as temperatures remained below freezing through the morning of Feb. 2.



WIBH Radio in Anna wraps up successful 2022 New Coats, New Hope Campaign

On Dec. 9, WIBH Radio in Anna wrapped up its annual coat campaign - raising more money than ever

Organizers of the campaign said that was good news for area families that have already experienced frigid cold winter weather and for agencies that receive the coats as stockpiles from previous year campaigns dwindle quickly.

Through monetary donations the 2022 WIBH New Coats, New Hope Campaign raised over \$12,000 to purchase 576 new, winter coats for kids in need in Southern Illinois.

Postal Pal in Anna covered the cost of shipping, which allowed 100 percent of the donations to be used only for coats.

COVID disaster proclamation ends in May

SPRINGFIELD - Exactly 38 months after the World Health Organization declared COVID-19 a global pandemic, Illinois will no longer be under a disaster proclamation as of May 11, Gov. JB Pritzker announced Tuesday, Jan. 31.

That's the same day President Joe Biden will end the national public health emergency, which just passed the three-year mark in January. The White House announced the May 11 end date on Monday, Jan. 30.

Pritzker had declared a public health emergency two days before the WHO's pandemic determination and has renewed his disaster proclamation every 30 days since then.

The repeated proclamations gave the governor authority for COVID-related actions such as closing schools, issuing stay-athome orders and mandating masks and vaccines. But they were a source of consternation for Pritzker's political opponents.

The governor had slowly rolled back his COVID-19 mandates over the past year, including an action in October when he reversed the requirement for vaccines, testing and masks in health care settings.

seven states with some sort of COVID-related emergency proclamation on its books.

These disaster declarations have allowed those states, including Republican-run Texas, to continue benefiting from COVID-era bumps in federal reimbursements for programs like Medicaid, additional benefits for those on food stamps and the ability to quickly deploy emergency workers to respond to areas in need, like hospitals with severely short staffing.

"Our state's disaster proclamation and executive orders enabled us to use every resource at our disposal from building up testing capacity and expanding our health care workforce to supporting our vaccine rollout and mutual aid efforts," Pritzker said in a statement.

Pritzker said 1.4 million children in Illinois received nutrition support under the additional Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program benefits.

He also pointed to the expansion of telehealth during the pandemic under his disaster proclamation, which has largely been adapted into state law after it proved popular with doctors and patients alike.

"Let me be clear: COV-But Illinois is still one of ID-19 has not disappeared," Pritzker said in the statement. "It is still a real and present danger to people with compromised immune systems – and I urge all Illinoisans to get vaccinated or get their booster shots if they have not done so

already." Opponents to Pritzker's repeated issuance of disaster proclamations insisted the governor was limited to the 30 days laid out in state law, but legal challenges to that effect ultimately failed after months of litigation.

The governor's disaster proclamation also allowed for the activation of the State Emergency Operations Center, which brokered cooperation between the leaders of different state agencies in response to COVID-19.

In a message to Congress on Jan. 30 Biden wrote that waiting until May to end the national public health emergency will avert "wide-ranging chaos and uncertainty throughout the health care system" than if it faced the "abrupt end" sought by the Republicancontrolled House.

Student from Anna member of team

SIU wins national championship at business solutions competition

National champions. That's the title a Southern Illinois University Carbondale business student team claimed in January when competing for the first time ever in the Deloitte FanTAXtic Case Competition, which asks students to present solutions to a realistic business challenge and address business and tax implications.

"Some of the best accounting programs in the country were at this national competition. For our program to win demonstrates the extraordinary program and students that we have at the SIU School of Accountancy," said Tim Hurley, the accounting clinical assistant professor who serves as the team's faculty adviser.

"It was an overwhelming joy to see these students put in so much hard work and to be rewarded for it on the national stage."

Hundreds of students from dozens of colleges and universities across the country competed in eight regional business solutions competitions, sponsored by Deloitte Tax LLP, with the top two teams from each advancing to the nationals in January at Deloitte University in Westlake, Texas.

The University of Southern California, USC, took second place, and third went to the University of California, Los Angeles, UCLA, last year's national champ.

The Salukis had bested two of the nation's top finishers from the past two years to advance to the nationals, and there, they also topped such tough competition as the University of Florida, the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign, the University of Illinois Chicago, the University of Tennessee and Brigham Young University.

"I am extremely proud of the hard work from my teammates as this wouldn't have been possible without 100 percent effort from everyone on the team," said Lexie Lingle, a sophomore accounting major from Anna.

"We have felt endless support from the faculty, staff and our fellow classmates, and

the spotlight to our university and our accounting program. Competing with many of the top universities in the nation, it was an amazing feeling to bring our talents to light and win the national competition."

The students credit the knowledge they had gotten through SIU classes and working with Hurley.

They also said the additional experience they received through several campus organizations was vital to their

Some cited knowledge and insights gained through their experience with the Saluki Student Investment Fund,

Carrazco and Morgan are members of SSIF, which manages a nearly \$3.5 investment portfolio for the SIU Foundation. The registered student organization consistently outperforms professional management firms in the S&P 400 Benchmark.

Some participate in the Accounting Society and Beta Alpha Psi, as well as the Beta Alpha Psi Volunteer Income Tax Assistance, VITA program, which provides invaluable exposure to accounting experience, Carrazco noted.

Each spring, student volunteers in the VITA program prepare income tax returns for low- to moderate-income community members.

'This gave us knowledge on the flow of the individual tax return and how certain calculations are incorporated," Piazza said.

Simulating True-to-Life Accounting Challenges

The contest presents students with a complex, real-world tax issue in an interactive format that includes case simulation, role playing and presentations.

The regional competition

contest went live. In both phases, Deloitte Tax LLP professionals, managers and partners offered the students support and guidance during the competition and posed as

Hurley said the national competition was an extension of the regional contest, in which each university student group was given a specific case to handle, representing a "client" who owns a business and wants to start a new, separate venture.

The teams had to consider which funding option would provide the lowest overall tax liability and what type of business entity should be formed, among other considerations.

"Our focus and goal in the national competition was to provide the best possible solution to our hypothetical client, as they were facing new tax challenges related to the business world today," said Piazza.

"We had to research topics related to inflation that were causing prices to rise in the supply chain, the start-up business' tax consequences for taking on a new investor to obtain funding, and how business operating losses can affect tax returns for entrepreneurs and investors."

Carrazco said the client was looking for ways to fund a second business, a campsite. He had a list of potential investors but could select just one, based on the share of the business each investor requested, possible marketing opportunities and the investors' expertise.

"We then had to consider which type of corporation the business owner should file based on the investment he accepted, and ultimately, which choice would result in the lowest tax liability for him and his company," Carrazco

Tough Task

There were many factors to be considered by the Salukis, and they said the contest posed a tough battle.

"The most challenging part of the competition for our team was the time constraints in providing a solution," Lingle said.

tion, which involved weighing and ranking the investors' offers, and three hours for the final presentation, which took the solution to the next level by preparing a scenario based on the recommended investor and other considerations.

"Although it was difficult, our team worked together very well," Lingle said. "We each took on a part of the task and worked to bring all of our parts together to create a visually pleasing, knowledgeable and accurate presentation."

Carrazco noted that the team worked hard and "utilized every second possible" to create the most professional presentation.

"We had to rely on each other and trust in knowing each teammate was working hard on perfecting their part of the solution," Piazza added. "All of us fit our roles perfectly, and we communicated efficiently, knowing we were very limited in time."

Underdogs Persevered

As first-time competitors, the students had no idea what to expect. Knowing they were not favored to win, they set their goals high.

"We were very content just being at Deloitte University among so many smart individuals," Carrazco said. "We knew that many of the teams around us were quite prestigious, but we were determined to prove that Salukis can compete with the best universities in the U.S.'

As the contest evolved, their aspirations grew.

"After giving our presentation and diligently answering the very challenging questions from the judges, we felt confident that we had done everything we could to put ourselves in a position to place in the top three," Piazza said.

Lingle agreed, noting that the Salukis "went into awards with confidence in our solution, coupled with a feeling of hope."

While they thought they had a great chance of placing, it was still a most excellent shock to come out on top, they said.

"Our reaction to winning was pure happiness! Hearing Southern Illinois University announced as first place will forever remain in my mind," Piazza said.

"When the SIU logo appeared on the screen showing us in first place, we knew all our hard work had paid off, and we could genuinely celebrate our accounting students being named the best in the country. With SIU being one of the smaller schools in the competition, we lived our underdog story and won while representing the amazing SIU community.'

The students definitely made their program and college proud, faculty and staff

say.
"It's such an exciting accomplishment for the SIU students to win this national competition, particularly since it's the first time they've even competed," said Benna Williams, School of Accountancy program coordinator and associate lecturer and CPA.

Students Benefitted in **Multiple Ways**

The SIU team members say their FanTAXtic experience allowed them to enhance their problem-solving, teamwork and public speaking skills. It's also a huge boost on their resumes and was a valuable opportunity for them to get real-world experience in the tax field in preparation for the careers they will pursue after graduation.

"It really means a lot to me," said Carrazco, "because I plan to pursue a career with Deloitte, hopefully at their Chicago location, and this was a great first step on that path."

He and his teammates said they also formed meaningful bonds with one another that they are confident will last a lifetime.

'One of my favorite things about this competition was how it brought me so much closer to my teammates," Piazza said. "I will forever cherish the memories I made with these incredible people, and they have become some of my best friends."


I received this letter from the Lions Club of Cobden along with their donation to Anna I would like to share telling about their Honor Wreaths for Veterans Day.



connected local growers, and National Sweet Cider farmers, farmers market associates and business owners to build alliances and partnerships.

Illinois' agriculture production goes far beyond corn and soybeans. Farmers across the state produce a wide range of specialty crops, a diverse variety of fruits, vegetables, tree nuts, dried fruits, horticulture and floriculture. Illinois ranks first in the nation for pumpkin and horseradish production, and among the top 10 in asparagus, cauliflower, fresh-cut herbs, green beans, lima beans, mustard greens and snap

Illinois also ranks third in the nation for the number of farmers markets, where consumers can purchase farm-fresh, affordable, convenient and healthy

The Everything Local Conference brought together such producers to learn new ways to strengthen and build the local food supply chain. It was also a time for celebration for all the hard work our farmers put in day in and day out.

The ISGA honored Amelia and Michael Howard, of Cook County, and Tom Schwartz, of Randolph County, with the 2022 ISGA Award of Excellence.

The Howards, long recognized as "urban farmers" before "urban farming" was popularized, have led the way for growers in their community. Their work has ushered in more than 25 years of agricultural education and created a safe haven for children in the Fuller Park community of Chicago through farming experiences that connect them with nature, agriculture and the world around

Schwartz is another strong leader among specialty crop producers. His extensive knowledge of horticulture and marketing has amplified the industry while teaching how horticulture can serve communities. ISGA was honored to recognize Schwartz for being a bright light for many specialty crop families, as well as a major supporter within the industry.

Many other specialty crop producers were recognized throughout the conference. Two fan favorite competitions also returned: the Illinois State horticulture Society's 33rd Illinois Contests and the 20th National Hard Cider Contest.

This year, Joe Ringhausen of Joe Ringhausen Orchards in Fieldon took home the gold as the No. 1 overall rated cider. His cider blends Jonathan, Golden Delicious, Red Delicious and Fuji apples for a winning combination. Wiles Family Orchard of Fairchild placed first in the Hard Cider contest as repeat champions. Their hard cider blends Gold Rush, Golden Delicious and Fuji apples.

Who doesn't love a cup of cold, refreshing cider after a hard day's work? Illinois is lucky to have such wonderful orchards.

Building and strengthening the local food supply chain wasn't the only goal this winter. In late January, about 500 young and beginning farmers attended IFB's annual Young Leader Conference to tackle challenges facing the next generation of farmers.

IFB's Young Leader Chair, Sadie Asher, of Henry County, outlined her priorities for the coming year. With more IFB members over the age of 90 than under 35, Asher called on her fellow young leaders to strengthen the organization's membership and recruit younger voices.

Our young farmers' talent was also displayed during the 2023 American Farm Bureau Federation, AFBF, annual meeting in San Juan, Puerto Rico. Evan Hultine, a Bureau County farmer, received third place in the AFBF Young Farmers and Ranchers Achievement Award competition. Kaylee Heap, of Kendall County, ranked fourth in the AFBF Excellence in Agriculture competition; and Ryan Reeverts of Ogle County was honored to represent Illinois in the AFBF Young Leader Dis-

cussion Meet. Winter is a period of downtime. That is a true statement for many farmers, but we're not staying idle. Illinois farmers continue to develop new best practices for their businesses, and celebrate those who are making our industry stronger, better and more effi-

Look...up in the sky...



A Chinese "weather balloon" passed through the sky over Union County last Friday evening. I'm guessing the folks in China spend a lot of their time worrying about the weather in Southern Illinois.

Late last Sunday morning, Bob and I were sitting out on the front stoop, enjoying the warm sunshine, which was quite welcome after our recent rounds of snow, sleet, ice and cold.

The promise of spring could be seen on both sides of the stoop: green leaves popping up through a layer of unraked leaves from

While pondering what we hope is the imminent arrival of spring, which, I know, isn't until March 20, I heard an unusual sound from above. The sound suggested that a jet aircraft was somewhere overhead.

That's odd, Bob said. I agreed. We don't often have jet aircraft flying overhead in Southern Illinois. Sure, it happens. Just not very often.

A moment or two later, I looked up and spotted a small, twin-engine aircraft heading south through the sky. Hmmmm, I thought. I'm guessing that's actually a Chinese "weather balloon" disguised as a jet aircraft.

And that bring us to the matter at hand...

Until this week, this space has never featured the words "force majeure." *In italics*.

Until last Friday, I had never seen a Chinese 'weather balloon" in the sky overhead.

Unless you've been taking a long winter's nap, which would probably be a good way to spend the months of December, January and February, you probably heard about the Chinese "weather balloon' which flew across the country during the past week. The "weather balloon's" journey came to a rather abrupt, and explosive end, over the Atlantic Ocean, just off our East Coast. But

you already know that. Friday evening, while watching the local news, mention was made that if one wanted to wander outside to bask in February's chill, one might actually catch a glimpse of the "weather balloon."

As noted, I had never seen a "weather balloon"

You can also visit the website for the Foreign Ministry of the People's Republic of China. Until Friday evening, I had never given any thought to the Foreign Ministry of the People's Republic of China. It doesn't come up much at any of the local government meetings that I frequent.

A Foreign Ministry "spokesperson" confirmed that the "airship is from China...It is a civilian airship used for research, mainly meteorological, purposes. Affected by the Westerlies and with limited self-steering capability, the airship deviated far from its planned course. The Chinese side regrets the unintended entry of the airship into US airspace due to force majeure. The Chinese side will continue communicating with the US side and properly handle this unexpected situation caused by force majeure.
