Those activities have included people who barbecue at the cemetery, sit on tombstones and shoot fireworks on the holiday, actions which are seen as a sign of disrespect for the cemetery.

City officials noted that the cemetery officially closes at dusk each day.

After discussing the matter, council member Brandon Bierstedt made a motion to close the cemetery for the holiday. The council voted unanimously in favor of the motion.

Dr. Susan Spellman, known in Anna and Jonesboro schools and among her squad of volunteers as the tutoring lady, is retiring.

For the past 14 years, Spellman, a Jonesboro resident, has trained and directed a volunteer program to tutor at-risk students in 1st through 8th grades in Anna and Jonesboro schools. Approximately 50 tutors have helped 150 students since the program began.

Spellman, who founded the program in 2003 af-

Dee Armes, minister of the church, said numerous young people over the years had been rescued from "failing grades often to As and Bs.²

Herb Hall, a SEMO retiree and Anna resident, recounted how two of the pupils he had tutored graduated from high school.

"That is our payment," Spellman said.

"The program has changed lives," Armes said. He added that the students "have been told by someone important to them that they matter."

The reception was not the first time Spellman was angel.

The article reported on Spellman's behavior management techniques. One incentive of her program was to invite students who were well behaved to a home-cooked dinner at her residence.

In her first year after retirement from SEMO, Spellman trained volunteer librarians for Jonesboro Elementary School. The volunteers replaced the professional librarian who had been eliminated by the school due to financial stringency.

Then Spellman asked the FCC church elders to have the church sponsor the tutoring program. The elders agreed and the program became part of the church's outreach ministry.

There has always been a faith component to the in public schools before program," Armes said.

Spellman and her husband Robert reside in a Jonesboro home built in 1857 by John Dougherty, who was a friend of Abraham Lincoln and a lieutenant governor of Illinois. Her husband is an emeritus faculty member of the School of Journalism at Southern Illinois University at Carbondale.

Spellman was raised in Ohio and was valedictorian of her 1954 Cuyahoga Falls High School class.



Traffic made its way through the railroad crossing on South Main Street in downtown Anna on Wednesday morning, May 17. On May 17, the Illinois State Police, Anna Police Department, Union County Sheriff's Department and the CN Railroad Police conducted a railroad crossing safety detail in Anna. Illinois State Police District 22 posted on Facebook that the detail focused on railroad crossing violations primarily vehicles stopping on the tracks. The safety detail yielded 33 written warnings for stopping on the tracks, two warnings for failure to wear seatbelts and two warnings were issued for cellular telephone violations. The river then is expected to fall below flood stage early Wednesday morning, May 31.

At 8:30 p.m. Monday, the stage of the Big Muddy River near Murphysboro was at 23.2 feet. Flood stage is 22.0 feet. Minor flooding was occurring.

Anna woman sentenced on drug charge

Union County State's Attorney Tyler R. Edmonds reported May 16 that Sharon M. Sargent, 59, of Anna has been sentenced to six years in the Illinois Department of Corrections on one count of participation in methamphetamine manufacturing, which is a Class X felony.

Sargent also will serve a two-year term of mandatory supervised release, formerly know as parole.

Sargent was arrested in January after an investigation by the Union County Sheriff's Office and Union County Drug Task Force showed she had manufactured methamphetamine at a rural Jonesboro residence between January and June of 2016.

Everything's coming up lavender at agribusiness in Union County

(Editor's note: the following article is shared by Susan Odum, who is a University of Illinois Extension community economic development educator.)

Early June is a great time to enjoy the excellence of Southern Illinois' grape and wine industry at one of the many vineyards within the boundary of our unique grape growing region, the Shawnee Hills American Viticultural Area.

Over 25 years ago, the Renzaglia family at Alto Vineyards in Alto Pass stepped into unknown territory, introducing a new industry to our region.

U-Pick Lavender

As you savor some of the award-winning wines that display the region's distinct character, you might happen upon a sign for u-pick lavender.

Lavandula, commonly named lavender, is a perennial herb in the mint family. It is indigenous to countries bordering the Mediterranean, and grows best in climates that don't have a lot of high heat or humidity, not exactly descriptive of Southern Illinois. Charlotte and Doug Clover live within the rolling hills and sandstone scenery of Southern Illinois, just south of Alto Vineyards. And just as the Renzaglia family stepped into unknown territory in the late 1980s, the Clovers are working against the odds as they develop their field of lavender on a hillside near their home in Union County.

Slugs can be nuisance, cause damage to garden

and a real garden pest. A rainy spring like this year's sometimes results in numerous slugs that cause heavy damage, especially on hosta.

Phil Nixon, a University of Illinois Extension entomologist, shared some information about slugs.

Slugs, which are shellless snails, are usually a problem on thin-leaved plants growing in shady areas: hosta, violets, and impatiens.

Following a spring with prolonged, heavy rainfall, slugs are often also numerous in sunnier areas, feeding on a wide range of plants.

The most common species is the gray garden slug, which is usually about 3/4 inch long but may be up to 1-1/2 inches long.

Slugs have two pairs of tentacles extending from the front end of the body. The upper, longer pair are optic tentacles with eyes on the tips. There is also a shorter pair near the ground that is sensory tentacles for feeling and smelling.

The largest structure is the foot, which runs the length of the slug. The underside of the foot is called the sole.

Slugs feed with tiny teeth that scrape away a leaf's surface and then the plant material underneath.

This feeding mechanism causes damage to appear

Slugs can be a nuisance most commonly as holes in the leaf. On some plants or in large numbers, slugs will eat the leaf margins.

> You can verify that slugs are responsible by checking for their presence at night or on foggy mornings.

Slime trails might also be visible in the morning when they reflect the sunlight before drying up.

Slugs need a moist environment to survive, and they feed on decaying organic matter.

The best long-term control involves reducing this supply. Under less rainy conditions, spacing plants farther apart or pruning them back allow better air circulation and creates drier conditions that are difficult for slugs.

Eliminating fallen leaves, bark mulch, and other dead organic material will reduce slug numbers by reducing food sources.

Baits are used to attract snails and slugs into traps where they then drown.

One popular type of bait is beer. Pour beer into a shallow pan and sink it into the ground with the pan edges sticking up 1/8 to 1/4 inch.

Snails and slugs are attracted to the yeasty smell of beer, and they fall into the pan and drown.

Commercial poison baits are also available. Read labels carefully and be careful because dogs can be harmed if they eat them.

"As we age, we lose neurons, but these neurons can form new connections." said Jim Wirth, a human development specialist with University of Missouri Extension.

"Research is being conducted now to determine if new brain connections develop with mental and physical exercise. Many researchers already believe that is the case."

According to Wirth, the brain of a senior citizen is similar to the brain of a healthy young person. But, like muscles in our body, the brain can grow and change. The harder a person uses her or his brain, the more it grows and the healthier it becomes.

"Each day we commit millions of pieces of data into our short and long term memories," said Wirth.

"As we get older, it becomes harder to retrieve because we are on overload. Plus, we don't memorize as easily because we don't practice the skill as often as we did when young."

Wirth also suggests using exercises to improve specific mental functions.

"For example, do a daily mental exercise each morning," said Wirth. "You could begin the day by counting out loud backward from 100 or reciting the alphabet, giving each letter a word."


"Many of the same activities that we use to stimulate the minds of young children can be fun and stimulating for us as older adults," said Wirth.

"The key is to try and do something new to keep your brain and mind young," said Wirth.

The word Ebenezer comes from the Hebrew words, "Eben hà-ezer," which simply means "stone of help." When Robinson wrote his lyrics, he followed the word Ebenezer with the phrase, "Hither by Thy help I've come." An Ebenezer, then, is simply a monumental stone set up to signify the great help that God granted the one raising the stone. In Robinson's song, it figuratively meant that the writer-and all who sing the song-acknowledge God's bountiful blessings and help in their lives





Alligator gar reintroduced

The Illinois Department of Natural Resources, IDNR, Division of Fisheries has published its Fish Species Management Plan for Alligator Gar in Illinois.

The plan details IDNR's effort to reintroduce the alligator gar to Illinois waters.

A fish native to Illinois, the alligator gar was determined to be extirpated, or extinct from Illinois waters.

The last known catch of the fish, prior to the start of the reintroduction effort, was in the Cache River basin in Southern Illinois in 1966. The alligator gar is the largest of the gar species and is the second largest freshwater fish in North America, next to the white sturgeon. IDNR Fisheries personnel last fall stocked approximately 1,600 alligator gar as part of the reintroduction program at locations throughout the state. The success of the plan will be documented through annual progress and achievement reports for each management objective, and the plan will be updated as needed.







Special treats for your holiday grilling...

WARNING: If you are squeamish about eating dead things, other than hamburger, Please DO NOT Read This. If you are a member, or supporter, of PETA, Please DO NOT Read This.

A fellow traveler on The Journey Through Life passed through The Paragraph Factory one morning last week and mentioned something about how this space often features pictures of various critters - but there are never any critter recipes.

Well, dear readers, this week we shall remedy that situation. Maybe you'll get an idea or two for your Memorial Day grilling.

During The Journey Through Life, yours truly has been fortunate, if that is the right word, to have enjoyed all sorts of what might seem like unusual culinary treats - shark (and various other members of the finny tribe), turtle, rattlesnake, frog legs, antelope, venison, buffalo, Rocky Mountain oysters, rabbit (the wild variety), squirrel and even shrimp on the barbie. They all tasted like chicken.

(The shrimp on the barbie might not seem all that exotic, but the locale might have been, since the treat was served in Australia.)

With the comment about recipes fresh in my mind, I immediately headed to the internet and Google to do some research. Or, as those of us engaged in creating fake news call it – research.

The research turned up about 48 billion results for weird, strange and unusual wild game recipes.

One site your intrepid journalist visited online was called cdkitchen - "it's what's cooking online!" The exclamation mark, and the use of all lower case letters, made the site seem pretty legitimate.

The site featured all sorts of exciting recipes for treats that included Louisiana Sweet and Sour Alligator, Texas Armadillo, Barbecue(d) Raccoon, Pig Feet in Tomato Sauce, Deep-Fried Rattlesnake, Fred's Muskrat and Baked Possum.

The ingredients for that last one, Baked Possum, included whiskey, celery, sweet potatoes, possum, beer, Tabasco sauce, salt, onions, garlic and Worcestershire sauce. You throw away everything except the whiskey and beer, set them aside, go to the store to get some chicken nuggets and potato salad, come back home, eat dinner.

The research for this colyum also took me to the Outdoor Life website, which would seem like a pretty reliable source. The website featured an article headlined: "Dare You To Eat This: Weird Wild Game." The article was the work of Outdoor Life "digital guru" Alex Robinson.

In a word, the headline which accompanied the article was, well, on target. Some of the "weird wild game" which Robinson wrote about included coyote, deer blood, deer heart, squirrel brain, rook pie, fish cheeks, eelpout, earthworms and dropped fowl.

Robinson shared the following tasty nuggets about some of those special treats, which I hope he doesn't mind me using:

Coyotes: Dishes include crockpot coyote, coyote burritos and something called "yodeldog burritos."

Deer Blood: "In many deer camps around the country it's tradition to drink the blood from the first deer you kill. Some people believe this is a way to carry the spirit of the animal with you, other people believe this a right of passage for a hunter and others believe this is a way to watch the new guy do something really gross."

Eelpout: "Also known as burbot or freshwater cod eelpout are regularly eaten in Minnesota. They're bottom feeders and by no means the most attractive looking fish in the lake, but they taste pretty good when they're cubed and served as nuggets." Earthworms: "Most outdoorsmen are more likely to

use worms for bait than dinner, but think twice before you toss out your crawlers. More and more people are experimenting with eating bugs and many times worms are on the top of the menu. They're high in protein and can be found in your very own backyard."

Squirrel Brain: "Squirrel brains are a regional delicacy in Kentucky. But adventurous eaters beware: in the late 90s scientists warned that eating squirrel brains could be linked to a rare form of mad cow disease in humans. I think I'll pass on this one."

Dropped Fowl: "This dish is common in Kentucky and calls for hanging a duck (or chicken) by the neck to age. How do you know when it's done? The fowl is ripe when the weight of the carcass makes it fall off the head, earning the dish its appetizing name.

Just in case you want to have something special for Memorial Day, here's a nifty recipe that was included in the "Dare You to Eat This" article:

Rattlesnake Hot Dogs

- 1 rattlesnake carcass 1 cup half n half or milk 1/2 pound fresh mushrooms, sliced 2 limes, sliced thin
- 1 tsp. basil
- 1 tsp. pepper
- 1 tsp. rosemary
- 1/2 cup chili 1/4 cup cheese
- Diced onions
- Hot dog buns

Cut snake into 3-inch sections and place in a large baking dish. Cover with cream or milk and add the mushrooms, limes, basil, pepper and rosemary. Cover tightly. Bake in 300 degree oven for 60 to 70 minutes or until done.Put rattlesnake in bun and top with chili, cheese, and diced onions. Get creative! Add your favorite hot dog toppings.

Bony appetite...that's Southern French for time to chow down...

The bottom line for all these possible goodies is how they taste. And I'm guessing that each and every one of them tastes like chicken.
