Elevated fire danger as dry conditions prevail

Record high temperatures last week in the region gave way to milder condi-

A lack of rain, however, has left the region very dry and with concerns about fire dangers.

Rain has been very sparse in the Union County area since the end of July.

Local weather observer Dana Cross reported that for the month of September, he had measured only .15 of an inch of rain through the 26th in Jonesboro.

curred in August, when rainfall for the entire month totalled .06 of an inch.

July was a wet month in the Union County area, with 8.27 inches of rain. However, the last significant rainfall to occur in the county occurred on July 20, when about .53 of an inch of precipitation was recorded.

Elevated Fire Danger Dry conditions, low humidity, strong winds and dry vegetation led the National Weather Service of-

alert about an elevated fire danger in parts of Southern Illinois, Southeast Missouri and Western Kentucky.

A U.S. Drought Monitor map posted on the website for the weather service office in Paducah showed that Union County and much of the surrounding area were experiencing abnormally dry conditions as of Sept.

"There is an elevated fire danger today due to abnormally dry vegetation, low humidity," the weather service office stated Monday on its website.

"An elevated fire dan-

ger will continue through Wednesday due to very dry vegetation and low humid-"Grass lands will contin-

ue to be a concern. We have seen a few field fires across the region," the weather service reported early Tuesday.

"Outdoor burning is strongly discouraged. Do not discard cigarettes. Fires

Similar conditions oc- fice in Paducah to issue an breezy northwest winds and can spread rapidly and act erratic during these kinds of conditions," the weather service advised.

> Dry weather was expected to continue in the region. As of early this week, no rain was in the forecast for the period through Sunday. Sunshine and high temperatures in the 70s are expected.

Gold Star Marker ceremony held Sunday in Anna

The successful culmination of a campaign which began earlier this year was commemorated at a ceremony held last Sunday afternoon in Union County.

The Anna-Jo Garden Club in February announced the launch of a campaign to help with the acquisition of a Gold Star Memorial Marker.

The Gold Star Memorial Marker was to be placed with honor at the Anna-Jo Garden Club Park. The park is located along East Vienna Street in Anna, next to McDonald's.

Anna-Jo Garden Club led an effort for the placing of a Blue Star Memorial Marker at the park.

A dedication ceremony for the Blue Star Memorial Marker was held on Nov. 11, 1997. November 11 is Veterans Day.

The Blue Star Memorial Markers are designed to pay tribute to the nation's armed forces as a whole.

The Garden Clubs of Illinois Inc. and its member clubs have placed 149 Blue Star Memorial Markers throughout the state since the program's inception in Illinois in 1948.

The Gold Star Memorial Marker program represents those fallen heroes who paid the ultimate sacrifice for the nation's freedom.

Gold Star families live daily with the pain of the sacrifice their loved one made for us.

Gold Star mother Melinda Clary was among those who attended the ceremony.

The garden club noted that prior to last weekend's ceremony in Anna, there were only two Gold Star Memorial Markers in the State of Illinois.

The nearest one to Union

County is in Peoria; the other is in the Chicago area.

Anna-Jo Garden Club said at the beginning of the campaign that adding a Gold Star Memorial Marker in Anna would represent the Garden Clubs of Illinois District VII and all of Southern Illinois communities.

The local garden club's members says that it is an honor to be able to host the marker that represents these brave men and women... and their families.

The campaign to bring a Gold Star Memorial Marker to Southern Illinois, and to Union County, proved to be successful.

That success was commemorated Sunday, Sept. 25, with a ceremony at the Anna-Jo Garden Club Park. Sunday also was Gold Star Mother's Day.

The Anna-Jo Garden Club, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the American Legion and the City of Anna invited the entire community to attend the Gold Star Memorial Marker dedication ceremony.

The ceremony began at 2 p.m. Sunday at the Anna-Jo Garden Club Park. The park is located near McDonald's.

Many were on hand for the ceremony on a warm and breezy September afternoon.

Prior to the ceremony, the Anna-Jo Garden Club, Garden Clubs of Illinois District VII and the National Garden Clubs again noted that they were honored to bring a Gold Star Memorial Marker to the City of Anna and Southern Illinois.

Sunday's ceremony also included rededication of the Blue Star Memorial Marker at the park.

With their newest project, Jerri and Nick Schaefer hope to add a shot of bourbon to the Southern Illinois adult beverage tourism scene.

"Our main focus is bourbon and bourbon appreciation," said Jerri Schaefer.

The Havisham Bourbon Bar in downtown Alto Pass houses a wide selection of noisseur, including varieties that might normally be difficult to find in the region.

"We are going to have bourbon tastings, so people can learn more about what we offer," said Shaefer. "We also have a lot of bourbon cocktails. So if people don't like a straight bourbon, we have options available."







IDNR shares updates on waterfowl seasons

The Illinois Department the South Central Zone and of Natural Resources, IDNR, is reminding waterfowl hunters about key dates and other information regarding the 2022-2023 waterfowl seasons.

2022-2023 Waterfowl Seasons

This is the second year of a five-year waterfowl season plan that was developed in 2020.

This fall, Illinois will open the regular duck, Canada goose and snow goose seasons on Oct. 22 in the North Zone, Oct. 29 in the Central Zone, Nov. 12 in Dec. 3 in the South Zone.

White-fronted goose (specklebelly) seasons will open Oct. 24 in the North Zone, Nov. 5 in the Central Zone and on the same dates as duck season in the South Central (Nov. 12) and South

zones (Dec. 3). The daily limit is six ducks of any species; however, daily limit can consist of no more than the following: four mallards (of which no more than two can be hen mallards), three wood ducks, two redheads, two canvasback, two black ducks, one pintail and one mottled duck.

Scaup (bluebills) will have a daily limit of two for the first 45 days of the season in each zone and one for the last 15 days of the

season in each zone.

The daily bag limit of mergansers is five, only two of which may be hooded mergansers. The possession limit for ducks and mergansers is three times the daily bag limit (18 and 15, respectively) by species and sex.

During the regular season, Canada goose daily limits will be three with a possession limit of nine. White-fronted goose daily bag limits will be two with a possession limit of six. The snow goose daily bag limit is 20 birds, with no possession limit, during the fall and winter seasons.

The spring Light Goose Conservation Order will open Jan. 20 in the North Zone and Feb. 1 in the Central, South Central, and South zones, ending April 30 in all zones. There is no daily bag or possession limit on snow, blue, and Ross' geese during the spring conservation order.

Seasons Now Open

Rail (Sora and Virginia only) is open statewide in all zones through Nov. 18, with a daily limit of 25 and possession limit of 75.

Snipe is open statewide in all zones through Dec. 25, with a daily limit of eight and possession limit of 24.

Canada goose (early season) closed Sept. 15 in all

IDNR noted that sunrise and sunset times are not included in the Hunting and Trapping Digest again this year. IDNR said that hunters should refer to this website for their local sunrise and sunset: https:// www.weather.gov/dvn/sunrise-sunset.

Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza, HPAI, Reminder

In coordination with other state and federal agencies, IDNR continues to monitor for outbreaks of the H5N1 strain of HPAI that was observed in Illinois during the spring.

Similar mortality events may occur as waterfowl arrive in Illinois from northern breeding grounds during the fall migration.

IDNR reminds waterfowl hunters to take precautions and to thoroughly cook game meat to an internal temperature of 165 degrees Fahrenheit.

Avoid handling sick or dead waterfowl found in the field. Do not allow dogs and other pets to consume waterfowl that died from unknown causes.

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

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

Early childhood programs awarded grant funding

Birth to Five Illinois has to the programs and services issued \$2.5 million in implementation grants that will reach 20 local early childhood collaborations and 35 counties across the state.

Grant recipients included the Southern Illinois Coalition for Children and Families, which received \$111,150.

The purpose of the funding is to help collaborations apply systemic strategies to the challenge of regaining and increasing enrollment into early childhood programs and services.

Grantees will employ various methods to reach this goal, including hiring dedicated staff, equipping community members with hotspots and laptops to serve as paid family liaisons, and improving coordinated intake processes to ensure families are connected for which they are eligible.

In April, Birth to Five Illinois published the eligibility requirements for the implementation grants to local early childhood collaborations.

The application opened in June and closed Aug. 5, after a two-week extension.

The lead-time for the application process was intended to allow time for some collaborations to solidify the SAM. gov registration, secure a Unique Entity Identifier, UEI, and become Grant Accountability and Transparency Act, GATA, certified, to meet an Illinois Department of Human Services requirement.

Angela Hubbard, grants and relationship Manager for Birth to Five Illinois, said in a news release:

"As we develop this new

statewide system with a focus on racial equity, our team worked hard to limit the barriers that often prevent early childhood collaborations from accessing available funding."

As part of this process, the application and all supporting resources were provided in Spanish and English. Birth to Five Illinois responded to over 200 email inquiries about the implementation grant.

"We continue to improve this process and are grateful for all our partners who have provided guidance," Hubbard said.

Birth to Five Illinois will follow this round of funding with a planning grant opportunity this fall aimed at helping newly forming collaborations become fully established.

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



Better politics, smarter government Renewed focus on civics education

Renewed focus on civics education critical for American democracy By John T. Shaw

I'm preparing to teach a class at Southern Illinois University next spring on restoring American statesmanship and am struck by the critical connection between engaged citizenship and successful statesmanship.

Put simply, active citizens expect, and even demand, more from their leaders than less engaged ones. Informed and concerned citizens care about good government and often reward public officials who provide it. Citizenship, in turn, is undergirded by an understanding of, and respect for, American history and government.

Numerous reports reveal declining knowledge about U.S. history in both our students and adults. A recent conversation with a terrific student who is now in medical school made this tangible to me. He is a serious and diligent young man with wide-ranging interests. In fact, the first time I met him he was reading Homer's "The Odyssey" – for fun, or at least personal enrichment.

During our conversation, I made a reference to the Marshall Plan, the historic American program to rebuild Europe after World War II and arguably one of our nation's greatest accomplishments. The student looked puzzled and said he had never heard of the Marshall Plan.

This surprised and saddened me. How is it possible that a highly motivated and deeply curious college student is not aware of the Marshall Plan?

I don't blame the young man. I blame our education system. To me, this suggests that our schools are not doing an adequate job in civics education. This results in adults who do not understand our nation's history or the structure of our government and are less likely to be engaged citizens.

Annual surveys by the Annenberg Public Policy Center at the University of Pennsylvania show the American public is not well informed on the basics of our history and government. This year's report revealed that less than half of Americans surveyed could name all three branches of the federal government and less than a quarter knew that freedom of religion, freedom of the press, the right to assembly, and the right to petition are rights listed under the First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution.

"When it comes to civics, knowledge is power," said Kathleen Hall Jamieson, the director of the Center, when announcing this year's findings. "We are unlikely to cherish, protect, and exercise rights if we don't know that we have them."

The good news is that there are people and organizations confronting this challenge.

Former Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor established iCivics about a decade ago to teach the fundamental principles of civics to middle and high school students with free online interactive games and courses that make learning fun, relevant, and effective. This program continues to generate creative approaches to teaching civics

There is bipartisan legislation pending in the U.S. House (HR 1814) and Senate (S 4348) called "The Civics Secures Democracy Act" which is worthy of careful study.

The bill authorizes \$1 billion annually over five years for civics education, primarily to states and school districts. It also provides competitive grants to qualifying institutions of higher education, nonprofits, and researchers for projects to improve civics and history education in elementary and secondary schools.

I hope this bill soon becomes law and that Illinois schools and researchers take advantage of its resources.

The United States faces a crucial point as it pertains to investment in civics education. The federal government now allocates 5 cents for every K-12 student in civics education compared to \$50 per K-12 student for science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) programs. This imbalance is not healthy for our democracy.

It is imperative that we find compelling and factual ways to explain how our government works and tell the American story to our young people, neither jazzing it up or dumbing it down. The truth is powerful and compelling. Despite many mistakes of omission and commission by America and Americans, the overall story of the United States, and Illinois, is impressive and inspiring.

I hope to persuade my students this spring that few nations have had leaders of the caliber of an Abraham Lincoln or a George Marshall – and that their wisdom and bravery was supported by wise and brave citizens.

We will need this level of statesmanship and citizenship in the years ahead.


